

REPUBLICANS SEE MAJOR 'BREAK' IN JOURNAL'S ACTION

Meeting of Oregon Organization Elated by Paper's Stand for Sprague—Party Principles Being Drawn

SALEM, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Several hundred Republicans met here today for the two-day fifth annual Oregon Republican club convention to formulate party principles for the November 8 general election.

The club's resolutions committee will draw up the platform late today, submitting it to the convention tomorrow.

The Marion county delegation will seek to change the club into a federation of local groups, instead of the present body of county units.

Harold Pruitt, Salem, club president, said today he would not seek reelection tomorrow.

Ed Boehmke, Eugene, was appointed chairman of the resolutions committee, and Harry Tuleman, Portland, was named to head the committee on constitution and by-laws.

Club officials had a difficult time getting the delegates into meetings, the delegates spending most of the day talking about the Oregon Journal's endorsement today of Charles A. Sprague and its rejection of Henry Hess and Willis Mahoney, Democratic nominees for governor and U. S. senator, respectively.

Many delegates said they considered the Democratic newspaper's action a "major break" for the G. O. P. forces in November.

Three proposed resolutions, all of which probably will encounter some opposition by the convention and the resolutions committee, included:

1. A national and state declaration of principles, to which all Republican candidates would be asked to subscribe.
2. A single form of taxation, on income or transactions, to finance all forms of social security.
3. Reform of the state tax system.
