The Demi-Tasse Is Popular Post-Dinner Social Feature

The demi-tasse, formerly associated only with the most formal households, is an increasingly popular feature of smart dinners and luncheons in less pretentious homes.

Call it demi-tasse, cafe noir, or just plain after-dinner coffee, the clear, steaming brew provides a delightful final touch to the meal.

The custom of drinking black coffee after dinner started years ago when diners had little regard for good dieting or dietetic value. Coffee was sipped in those days to aid digestion.

Now we are less concerned with the dietetic virtues of black coffee and it is valued as a sophisticated sip to sociability.

For the demi-tasse follow your regular method for making clear, flavorful coffee. But make it stronger than your breakfast brew. If you ordinarily use one rounding tablespoon of coffee to a cup of water, for example, increase it to one and a half tablespoons to a cup of water.

Serve the demi-tasse at the conclusion of the meal, either at the table or where the guests will gather when they leave the dining room.

The well-appointed after-dinner coffee tray will contain: dainty, small cups, after-dinner coffee spoons, the coffee pot, a small sugar bowl with tongs and a small pitcher of cream.

Ordinarily, the demi-tasse is served without sugar or cream. But some people prefer a little sweetening and cream so, for courtesy's sake, it is best to provide them.

If you like, you may serve a small confection with the demi-tasse. Assorted cream patties, fondant covered with nuts, candied fruits, small chocolate-coated candies, candied ginger or salted nuts are all suitable. Very fresh chocolate-covered cream peppermints are also quite refreshing.

Mocha Mint Patties

Follow usual directions for making fondant, substituting very strong black coffee for water in recipe. To make the Mocha Mint Patties: melt the ripened fondant over hot water. Take from fire and flavor with few drops oil of peppermint. Stir in two tablespoons powdered sugar for every cup of fondant. Drop from tip of the spoon onto a flat surface covered with waxed paper. When mints are firm, dip each one, with fingers, halfway into melted confectioner's chocolate (kept warm over hot water). Lift out onto waxed paper.

Bubbles sometimes appear on the top of hot jelly when it is poured into glasses. They should be removed as quickly as possible with a small spoon dipped frequently into warm water. Do not move the jelly until it is firm.

Fruit butters scorch easily because they are so thick. Placing the container on an asbestos mat helps prevent scorching. The butter should be cooked rapidly so it will keep its bright color. Use a long-handled wooden spoon, of the slotted type, for stirring. Because boiling butter bubbles a great deal, it's safer to wrap your stirring arm in a dish cloth to avoid burns.

For a delicious hot sauce to serve with lamb, melt half a cup of currant jelly over hot water, add a teaspoon of mint extract and serve at once, in a small dish. The sauce may also be poured over the lamb roast just before the roast is taken to the table.

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Hints for Housewives

Deviled ham gives creamed eggs a tangy flavor. Add about a fourth of a cup of ham to tap cups of the creamed mixture. The ham also blends well with creamed peas, asparagus, beans or cabbage.

Small hot rice croquette served with hot tomato sauce make a very satisfying main course for luncheon or supper. The combination is also tasty for Sunday morning "brunch."

When you use mayonnaise or salad dressing on sandwiches see that it is quite thick, so it will not run over the edges of the bread. Butter both slices of bread to seal it so that the filling or relish won't soak in.

When adding nuts to conserves slice or cut them into pieces of uniform size so they will be distributed evenly through the mixture. Nuts do not need much cooking, so don't add them until about 15 min-
