Wall St. Report

New York, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Prices moved ahead sharply in the stock market today as Wall Street took the Franco-British agreement with Germany and the Czech crisis as a sign immediate hostilities in Europe were unlikely. Steels, metal issues, motors, chemicals, farm equipments and a wide variety of miscellaneous manufacturing shares were in the van of the push. Turnover, reflecting the still uncertain tenor of European advances despite a brighter outlook, was restricted. Transactions were about 800,000 shares. Grains in Chicago moved down readily as traders who had bought last week on fear lifted their holdings. Wheat ended 3 1/2 to 2 cents a bushel lower and corn was down 1/2 to 1 1/4 cents. Cotton advanced. Share prices were strong from the opening, but most did not hold all gains to the finish. Coppers were one of the most active groups as domestic prices of the red metal and lead and zinc were advanced during the morning. Today's closing prices for 32 selected stocks follow: Am. SOVIET SUPPORT SOUGHT TO KEEP SUDETEN SECTOR

soviet press has been saying for weeks—that British Prime Minister Chamberlain's policy consistently has been to reach an agreement with Reichsfuehrer Hitler at Czechoslovakia's expense. Entente Agrees (By The Associated Press) The governments of Britain and France, agreed on a policy of keeping the peace at almost any cost, today ratified a tremendous international deal with Germany and apparently were urging Czechoslovakia to pay the price—her Sudeten areas. With almost desperate finality the British and French cabinets gave their approval, apparently ungrudgingly, to the decision of their plenipotentiaries yesterday to meet Germany's demands on Czechoslovakia. But Czechoslovakia, which had no part in the fateful decisions, still was to be reckoned with. Amid increasing resentment throughout the country, her cabinet met to study the Anglo-French plan that may mean her dismemberment. Concessions Listed Complete official silence was maintained in Great Britain but it was generally expected Prime Minister Chamberlain would not long delay his return trip to Germany to tell Reichsfuehrer Hitler what, officially, were said to be these concessions: 1. The Sudeten German districts of Czechoslovakia which voted 75 per cent or more for the Sudeten German party in district elections last May will be considered to have decided on union with Germany. 2. As soon as practicable, a new frontier will be drawn to include all such districts within Germany. 3. Districts which voted between 50 and 75 per cent for Sudeten German candidates last May will become autonomous areas within Czechoslovakia. 4. Populations will be exchanged to safeguard the liberty of German minorities which do not wish German rule and similar arrangements will be made for Czechoslovakia's Polish and Hungarian minorities. 5. Czechoslovakia's new frontiers will be guaranteed by the great powers and neighboring states—Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Poland, Hungary and Rumania; she will be released from her alliances with France and Soviet Russia; in other words, made "an independent neutral state" like Belgium. In Berlin, while still devoting corollary on claims to charges of terrorism against Sudeten Germans in Czechoslovakia, the Nazi-controlled press regarded Czechoslovakia as already written off. OREGON COAST TO GET AIR DEFENSE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—(AP)—Secretary of War Harry H. Woodring informed Senator A. E. Reames today adequate defense against air attacks would be provided on the Oregon and Washington coasts. "The program," he said, "calls for a considerable strengthening of the harbor defense installations, including their anti-aircraft defense, both at the mouth of the Columbia river and in the Puget Sound area."
