

APPLEGATE PAIR GIVEN FINE, JAIL FOR NIGHT HUNT

Commitment Withheld Pending Payment—Use Flashlight and Miss Deer.

Thomas M. Grove, 46, of Rich and Warren W. Cook, 48, of Applegate, were each sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$25 and \$4.50 costs by Judge William R. Coleman in justice of the peace court this morning.

Commitment was withheld and the men were given until 2 p. m. Monday to pay the fines and costs. If payment is made the jail sentence might be suspended, Judge Coleman told the men.

Grove and Cook were arrested at 11 o'clock last night immediately after firing a shot at a buck which they missed.

The two men were quoted as saying they did not intend to go hunting but could not resist the temptation to shoot at the deer when it crossed their range of vision.

It was indicated that complaints have been received about illegal hunting in the Applegate country. It is unlawful to hunt at night.

FUNDS EXHAUSTED FOR CHILD CARE

SALEM, Sept. 22.—(P)—Funds paid by the state to 11 privately owned child caring institutions will be exhausted next week, Budget Director Wallace S. Wharton said today.

There will be no funds available for the last three months this year, but the legislature, which meets in January, will be asked to remove the expected \$50,000 deficit.

Appropriations for the 11 institutions for the 1937-38 biennium totaled \$305,000.

The state pays each institution at the rate of \$16 a month for each child over five years of age and \$20 for each child under five.

There will be a \$1,824 deficit at the end of the year in the amount of state aid paid to the three private institutions caring for wayward girls. The biennial appropriation was \$80,000.

COAL SALES GAIN AT PHOENIX MILL

Increasing sales and other progress were reported today by L. L. Davis, general manager of the United Coal company which is operating a mine near Phoenix.

A growing demand for the coal by consumers in southern Oregon as well as inquiries from large companies regarding the qualities of the product was noted by Mr. Davis in stating that the company management is well satisfied with the success thus far attained.

Cruiser, chutes and screens will soon be installed to handle stoker coal and thus take care of future orders, Mr. Davis stated.

NORMAL STUDENT FINED \$35 ON WILD DRIVING CHARGE

Jack E. Cady, 21, of San Francisco, a student at the Southern Oregon Normal school in Ashland, was fined \$35 and \$4.50 costs in justice of the peace court this morning for reckless driving. He pleaded guilty and paid the fine and costs.

Cady was arrested by state police yesterday when he drove a car in a reckless manner along North Riverside avenue. Judge William R. Coleman was told by state police that Cady was also driving the car without an operator's license and with four adults in the front seat, both of which are unlawful. Cady was quoted as saying he did not know how to drive very well and that the car was owned by a man named Messenger.

Clifford M. Wagner, 21, of Eagle Point was fined \$1 and costs yesterday for operating a car without a muffler. He pleaded guilty. He was cited by state police on Crater Lake highway, September 18.

William Horne, a youth who had been employed on the farm owned by William M. Briggs, Ashland lawyer, received a six months suspended jail sentence on a charge of petty larceny. He was accused of stealing a rifle owned by Mr. Briggs. He pleaded guilty. He sold the rifle. It was brought out. Mr. Briggs took him back to the farm where, it was understood, he would continue to work and make restitution for the theft.

BRITISH TOLD TO DEPART PRAGUE

LONDON, Sept. 22.—(P)—The Exchange Telegraph company (British news agency) said today the British legation at Prague had instructed all British subjects to leave the Czechoslovak capital immediately.

It said a special airplane from London already had left Prague with several Britons. Women of the British legation were reported to have left by train after orders to quit the city.

AMENDED ANSWER FILED IN TAYLOR ORCHARD ACTION

An amended answer was filed by counsel for the defense this morning in the circuit court suit of Tom I. Taylor, Central Point orchardist, who seeks a permanent injunction restraining state and county agricultural officials from removing any more assertedly diseased pear trees from his orchard.

Presentation of defense testimony was resumed after filing of the amended answer. Newbury & Newbury, plaintiffs' counsel, received the right to demur or take other appropriate action regarding the amended answer. The amended answer was submitted by H. Lawrence Lister, an assistant attorney general, who is acting with District Attorney Frank J. Newman as defense counsel.

The amended answer was prepared at the suggestion of Judge H. D. Norton who said he preferred a wider base for any decree he might enter. In commenting upon the amended answer Judge Norton said that unlike most litigation this case involves public rights.

"In this case a large and important industry is involved," the judge said. "The prosperity of the whole community is threatened by pear tree disease. There is a vast capital invested in the orchard business and the industry is important to every business and professional man, every lawyer, every farmer, to everyone in the community. The pear industry is one of the foundations of the prosperity of this community and blight is a threat to this prosperity."

"The state has an official organization to cope with this disease and all must cooperate. The objective

cannot be reached without fair and honest cooperation on the part of the growers."

Judge Norton said he hoped that a standard could be established from this case for guidance in any similar cases that might arise.

The judge added, however, that the court was not passing on whether the officials have the constitutional right to cut out trees without a court order.

In objecting to the amended answer Gus Newbury of plaintiffs' counsel said it had not been contended the officials did not have the right to remove the blight, but argued that they had no constitutional authority to cut out the orchard.

ROAN GREEN SENT TO ACTIVE DUTY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Roan J. Green, Medford, Ore. aviation cadet naval reserve, has been ordered to active duty with cruising scouting squadron six, the navy department announced yesterday.
