

WELFARE WORKER EXPLAINS RELIEF NEEDS OF COUNTY

Indigent Medical Care Here
Praised By Mrs. Lyman
At Session.

"From womb to tomb insecurity haunts man," with this quotation Mrs. Blanche Lyman, administrator of the Jackson county relief committee, opened an enlightening talk Thursday afternoon before the Jackson County Public Health association in bi-monthly session.

Stressing the ever increasing demands for hospitalization now confronting the relief committee and the inadequacy of funds, Mrs. Lyman outlined the plan with which Jackson county tries to meet those demands. She also traced the history of federal legislation, aimed to care for the medical needs of all groups of people, and presented figures of the national health survey, showing that the family of the low-salaried man is receiving even less medical care today than in the past.

"Medical plan for indigent care" was the topic chosen by Mrs. Lyman. Until 1937, she stated, the care of the medically needy in Jackson county had been handled chiefly by the county court. The problem was then turned over to the relief committee. It was soon realized that the burden was too great to be handled by the public health officer along with his many other duties and a half time county physician was employed to make all home calls, she pointed out. The position is now filled by Dr. William W. P. Holt. The physician makes the home calls, decides whether or not hospitalization is necessary, reports to the relief office, where the eligibility of the individual is determined from the relief standpoint. He is then sent to the hospital nearest his community, where, with the cooperation of the Jackson County Medical society, his case is given care, Mrs. Lyman explained.

"Fortunately here," Mrs. Lyman stated, "we have a medical society which is liberal and forward-looking. The members give of their time and care for all hospital cases free of charge on a panel plan."

Even with this plan in operation, however, she pointed out, funds for medical care are inadequate when compared with the demands. A large amount of the general assistance money is spent on medical care and the demands for hospitalization are growing every day, she emphasized. The committee's aim is to give service to as many needy as possible, she said.

The social security act Mrs. Lyman described as the first federal legislation sufficiently inclusive to care for all groups of people. But even social security, she explained, is not eating for millions needing aid.

The next move toward securing adequate medical aid, she stated, was in the Wagner resolution No. 265, which is to be presented in the form of legislation to the next congress. The national health conference followed and was attended by representatives from every walk of life, who demanded a five-point program, similar to the Wagner resolution—expansion of maternal and child welfare, hospital facilities, public medical care for the medically needy, a medical program by taxes or insurance, she related.

Figures of the national health survey, Mrs. Lyman stated, showed that of the nation's relief group 30 per cent receive medical care. In families with salaries of \$3,000 or more 80 per cent receive medical care while in families with salaries of \$2,000 and under only 28 per cent receive medical care, she said.

A letter from Miss Mildred T. Carlton, president of the Public Health association, was read by Mrs. R. E. Green. In it Miss Carlton welcomed Dr. A. E. Merkel back into the position of public health officer after several months of advanced study and congratulated Miss Helen Parrish, public health nurse, who has received a scholarship which will take her to Boston for several months of graduate work. Miss Carlton also announced that the projector, which is her "birthday gift" to the schools, has been ordered and will soon be here for use.

The year's program of the Jackson county public health nurses was outlined for the association by Mrs. Blanche Fribble, supervisor. She also explained the duties of the county health officer in answer to association requests. She stated that 1,500 tuberculosis tests will be done in the schools during the coming year and that prenatal work is steadily expanding in the county.

Mrs. F. Corning Kenly, chairman of the dental clinic committee of the association, announced that the clinics will be resumed the first week in October by the following dentists of the Southern Oregon Dental society: Dr. C. P. Johnson, Dr. Robert D. Coe, Dr. C. C. Goldsberry, Dr. B. R. Elliott, Dr. L. L. Sanders and Dr. R. C. Van Valzah.

Mrs. Howard Hill reported an increased attendance at pre-school children's clinics and community reports were made by Mrs. W. H. Higgins of Talent, Mrs. Elwood Hedberg of Ashland, Mrs. John Gammit, Phoenix, Mrs. Roy Stanley of Eagle Point, Miss Helen Bullis of Medford, and Mrs. Peter Pick of Jacksonville.

Mrs. R. E. Green presided at the session in the absence of Mrs. J. H. Puller, vice president, and the program was presented by Mrs. I. E. Schuler, education chairman. Tea was served at the close of the meeting by members of the Ashland committee.
