

8 WORKERS DEAD WHEN SECTION FT. PECK DAM FALLS

FORT PECK, Mont., Sept. 23.—(AP)—The bodies of seven of eight workmen entombed when a third of a mile of the upstream face of \$100,000,000 Fort Peck dam gave way were hidden under millions of tons of soft dirt and rock today.

The body of Albert V. Stoesser, 23, Park Grove, Mont., was found late yesterday soon after the huge section of the dam's east abutment roared toward the lake forming behind the dam on the Missouri River.

Hours of dangerous search on the loose slide slope, 2,000 feet long and 900 feet high, convinced searchers none of the missing would be found alive. The entire dam is nearly three miles long.

The missing, all Montanans, were Nelson P. Van Stone, 31, and Douglas J. Moore, 35, Fort Peck; Archie E. Mohr, 26, Hinsdale; J. I. Johnson, 25, Park Grove, and Delphine Paulson, 41, and Walter Lubbinge, 20, New Deal.

Major Clark Kittrell, United States Army engineer in charge of construction of the dam, largest earth-

fill dam in the world, announced a preliminary survey did "not indicate any reason for alarm should exist regarding the security of the main dam." He said the water level of the lake, now 90 feet deep, was 15 feet below the damaged abutment.

Major Kittrell said construction was not halted on the dam, started four years ago and now nearing completion. It was designed to provide flood control, irrigation and improved navigation on the Missouri between Sioux City, Iowa, and St. Louis.

CCC YOUTH GETS PAROLE, TRIP HOME

Merrion E. Johnson, CCC youth from Henderson, N. C., was today on his way back home where he faced a dishonorable discharge from the corps because of a crime committed here early last Sunday morning.

Johnson, waiting preliminary technicalities, pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny from a person before Judge H. D. Norton in circuit court late yesterday afternoon. He was sentenced to a maximum indeterminate term of 18 months in state prison and paroled to District Attorney Frank J. Newman to whom he was ordered to report by mail once a month. Johnson was taken home on a CCC troop train that left here for the east last night.

The 20-year-old enrollee knocked down and stole \$80 from C. L. Baynes of Grants Pass. He denied slugging Mr. Baynes, saying he pushed him and he fell over.

1938 SEAL SALE MEETING CALLED FOR COMING WEEK

Representatives of each community will again be asked to manage the booths on certain days of the campaign, taking the returns back to their communities to be included in their individual quotas. TREASURY BERTH GIVEN TO FDR KIN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The White House announced today President Roosevelt has appointed Preston Delano of Massachusetts as comptroller of the currency, succeeding J. P. O'Connor, who resigned to run for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in California.

Stephen Early, Mr. Roosevelt's secretary, said the job had been held over for O'Connor, who was unsuccessful in the gubernatorial race.

O'Connor, Early told reporters, advised the president he did not desire reappointment and he would return to California to practice law.

Delano is a distant relative of the president. He has been in the government service five years.

Observers Around World Study Movements of Sun

PHILADELPHIA—(UP)—Heat, humidity and other disturbances which make life uncomfortable for most people, do not concern I. M. Levitt of the Franklin Institute whose job it is to watch movements of the sun daily.

Levitt's chief concern is whether the sun will shine brightly enough to enable him to make his observations.

He is one of 18 men scattered around the world who work in "shifts" studying the sun under the sponsorship of the International Astronomical Union. Other observation posts are located in California, Tokyo, Nanking, Kodaikanal, India; Kharkov, Russia; Italy, Switzerland, and England.

At 11 a. m. daily, Levitt "takes over" the sun from the English observer at Greenwich. At 1 p. m. the sun goes into the "custody" of the Mount Wilson, Calif., observer, and periodically thereafter each of the other stations takes it up.

Levitt works in the private observatory of Dr. Gustavus Wynne Cook, where he uses a photoheliostat to take pictures of the sun, and a spectroheliograph which enables him to watch the sun with the light of a single wave length.

Around the sun are found clouds of burning hydrogen gas, Levitt says. Occasionally the hydrogen gets brighter and spreads over a large area, forming a phenomenon called eruption.

"We chart the time taken for the beginning and ending of these eruptions," Levitt said. "We record their intensity, magnitude, position and speed."

The reports are sent to the headquarters of the union in France, where worldwide sunspot reports and figures are prepared.

RETAIL TRADE IN EAST RAIN BESET

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Beset by rainy weather, retail trade this week at leading centers of distribution sagged under last week and averaged 3 to 14 per cent under the like week of 1937 for the country as a whole, Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

Wholesale buying gained a little, but ran 4 to 15 per cent under last year.

Besides bad shopping weather, there were other factors tending to make this week's showing poorer than last in the retail division, the credit agency said. In most centers it was pointed out, buying of school and college apparel and supplies was not the important factor that it had been in the preceding week.

The rains and cooler temperatures, however, stimulated some buying of shoes, millinery, fall clothing and raincoats.

HANDCUFFED MAN ESCAPES GUARDS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 23.—(AP)—Notwithstanding he was handcuffed, E. P. Cavanaugh, 38, Portland salesman escaped from the Oregon state hospital last night as officers were preparing to admit him as a patient.

Cavanaugh became unmanageable in the Portland police station when sentenced to 30 days for a minor violation and did considerable damage before he was overpowered. He made two unsuccessful efforts to escape before being taken to Salem.
