

# All Coast Conference Teams But Stanford See Week-End Action

## 3 INTERSECTIONAL GAMES, FEATURES OF GRID OPENER

### Alabama Given Edge Over Troy, Bruins Over Iowa—Oregon Teams Picked.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23.—(AP)—All Pacific Coast Conference members with the exception of Stanford, unveil their 1938 war machines this week-end in football disputes which include three intersectional games.

Two of the intersectional skirmishes will be fought on this coast with the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins firing the opening gun against the invading University of Iowa eleven tonight. Alabama's squad of expert serialists oppose Howard Jones' University of Southern California Trojans in the other Saturday at Los Angeles.

The University of Washington Huskies, picked by many as the team to beat in the conference this year, renew acquaintances with the usually powerful University of Minnesota at Minneapolis Saturday. Two years ago the Minnesotans dumped the Huskies in a close game at Seattle.

California's Bears, last year's conference champions, open the season in Berkeley Saturday against the St. Mary's Gaels, a big-little football team whose usually loquacious coach, Slip Madigan, has had little to say about this season. Last season the Bears swamped the Gaels, 30 to 7.

In the only conference game Saturday which will go into the standings, Washington State will play host to the University of Oregon at Pullman and try to avenge a 10-to-6 licking administered them by the Webfeet last season. The Webfeet, under a new coach, G. A. Oliver, are considered the darkhorse squad of the conference while Coach Babe Hollingbery of Washington State is fielding a fast team with a green forward wall.

University of Idaho's Vandals, with one of their strongest teams in years coached by Ted Bank, will try to repeat their 7-to-6 win of last season over the Oregon State Beavers at Corvallis in another Saturday opener.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Dipping lightly into the nearest desk drawer for a load of blank cartridges, this well-kept football guesser pens harmless fire on the 1938 season and asks only for just enough time to duck when the gun backfires.

Skipping hesitatingly over the chalk lines otherwise: Oregon State over Idaho in a close one; and Oregon over Washington State.

Southern California-Alabama: Alabama's first-string line averages 203; Southern California's 200. Alabama's backfield is experienced, versatile and fast; ditto Southern California. Alabama, hoping to get a Rose Bowl bid for next January, 1 in order to avenge that beating by California last New Year's Day, needs to get off on the right foot. So does Southern California which sees a chance to return to the top for the first time in five years. One trembling vote for Alabama.

Minnesota-Washington: Washington is bringing a veteran backfield, minus only Fritz Washkowitz from last year, to Minneapolis, but there is enough doubt about the Huskies' line to warrant a ballot for Minnesota's Big Ten champions.

California-St. Mary's: The Golden Bears' Rose Bowl champions have suffered heavy graduation losses but there is plenty of man-power there. Vic Bottari and Dave Anderson ought to pull California through this one.

U. C. L.-Iowa: A big line will help Iowa this year but we'll take U. C. L. A. and hope nobody saws off the limb.

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## CRATERS LINEUP SAME FOR DUCKS

With only one possible exception, the identical lineup which carried the crashing Craters to the 1938 Southern Oregon league baseball pennant will be used against the Portland Beavers next Tuesday afternoon at the high school park. Manager Paul "Hoosier" Hoffard has announced. Riney Cook, regular third baseman, may not be available, and in case he isn't the Craters plan to obtain Howerton. Grants Pass hot corner guard, for the exhibition tilt.

Lyle Turpin, Ray Erickson and Bill Rathke will all be available for mound duty, and the remainder of the Crater club will spread out as per usual.

The Beavers, under the guidance of Doc Leonard Melke, veteran trainer, are now on their barnstorming swing through Idaho and eastern Oregon. With the exception of Sweeney, Fredricks and Rosenbergs, all the regulars will appear in the Medford encounter, including Steve Coscarat, Marshall, Jeffries, Morrissey, Dickey, Kintana, Cronin, McMillan and pitchers Thomas, Radonits and Whitey Hiecher, and probably others.

The game will mark the second appearance of a Coast league club in Medford in 30 years, and a record crowd is expected to attend. It will start at 3:30 sharp, enabling business men and office workers a better opportunity to attend than would be the case if the starting time was an hour earlier.

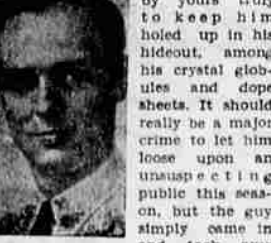

## TOBIN LIKELY TO STARTING HURLER IF BUGS VICTORS

### Pittsburgh Chances to Cop Flag Better, and Ace Pitcher Seeks Revenge

Between now and the time Pie Traynor sits down to figure out the Pittsburgh pitcher he'll throw at the Yankees to start the World Series, you're going to hear a lot of that "sweet revenge" buildup in favor of Jim Tobin.

Of course, there's the little matter of sewing up the National League pennant still in front of Pie and his Pirates, but after knocking off the Brooklyn twofers, 6-0 and 11-0, yesterday, there doesn't seem much the Bucs can do any more about getting out of it. They're in a spot now where they can drop three of their ten remaining games and still win, even if the second-place Chicago Cubs sweep the 11 left on their schedule.

About Tobin, there are whispers he is looking for a chance to go to work on them that Yanks. The world champions obtained him from Oakland in '36, then left him there to undergo an appendectomy, and in '37, after bringing him up again, they sold him "down the river" to the Bucs. The story now is that Jim doesn't figure he got a square shake. The Hanks didn't give him enough of a tryout to show he knew the difference between his fast one and his curve.

Yesterday, Jim's four-hit job in the opener took all the starch out of the Dodgers, who have been about as pleasant as the hives to the Pittsburghs this year. Before that he stopped the Giants twice in as many starts, just when it appeared Billy Terry's Terriers were getting tough again. Prior to that he halted what looked like the start of a losing streak with a five-hitter against the Cubs.

As a result of his tossing yesterday, along with Arky Vaughan's slick-stick-work in the nightcap, the Bucs left for the West still boasting a 3½-game edge over the Cubs, who also turned in a double win over the Phils in the first full National League program in four days. Bill Lee equalled a National League record with his fourth straight shut-out, by a 4-0 count, in the opener, and Clay Bryant came through 2-1 in the afterpiece. The Giants regained third place by kicking the Cincinnati Reds around twice, 6-1 and 2-1.

The Yankees finally snapped out of their eight-year record six-game losing streak by overpowering the White Sox, 7-4.

Boston's Bees, determined to hang onto fifth place in the senior circuit chase, nipped the Cardinals twice, 6-5 and 4-1.

## FISHING OUTLOOK ON COAST BETTER

PORTLAND, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Coast fishing promises to be good this week-end, according to the state game commission's weekly roundup.

Salmon fishing was described as excellent in many streams draining into the Pacific. The report included the following county comments:

Benton county—No improvement in conditions, though some blue backs have been taken in the lower Alsea river.

Tillamook county—Tillamook, Nehalem and Nestucca bays have all heavy runs of salmon. Although few fish have been taken this week, the Saturday and Sunday outlook is good. Many silversides have entered Nestucca river.

Douglas county—General conditions fair. Few steelhead taken every day from Winchester bay to Steamboat on the Umpqua river. Salmon trout have been taking flies, single eggs and spinners. The best conditions being found on the forks downstream. Fairly good fishing for time of year on Little river and South Umpqua.

Josephine county—Unfavorable weather conditions, not lack of fish, have resulted in poor angling for about a week. A near record run of steelhead was sighted near Illabe but apparently bright hot days put the fish deep in cool pools on the lower Rogue. The best fishing has been on the stretch between Gold Hill and Gold Ray dam.

Klamath county—Fair trolling in Klamath lake near Harrison lodge and Rocky point. Trollers have had good luck in Agency lake near the mouths of Williamson and Wood rivers. North and south forks of Sprague fall for egg fishermen.
