

LEGION CONCLAVE ADJOURNS, VIEWS FLEET MANEUVERS

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The American Legion, its business and pleasure disposed of, gave Los Angeles back to the Angelenos today and prepared to go home after viewing fleet maneuvers at Los Angeles harbor.

The exodus got under way yesterday—spurred partially by reports of hurricane damage on the eastern seaboard—but by this morning bulging hotels were back to normalcy and citizens began riding the streetcars through downtown streets again—a pleasure largely denied them since Saturday.

The convention adjourned yesterday after election, as expected, Stephen J. Chadwick of Seattle, as national commander by acclamation and drafting a series of resolutions directed generally toward keeping "America for Americans."

Most of the debate on resolutions centered upon a universal draft law. The legion finally accepted a minority report from the resolutions committee which would permit the universal draft but would leave to congress determination of the manner of enforcing it. The majority recommendation would have set up the legion's idea for mustering the country's facilities in time of war.

Such proposals as an adequate national defense, deportation of aliens, stricter immigration laws, continuation of the child welfare program, and opposition to "Iama" except Americanism were voted by acclamation.

RUMOR FORD WILL BUILD CHEAP CAR

DETROIT, Sept. 23. (UP)—In spite of insistent denials from company officials, rumors persisted that Henry Ford is about to come out with a new medium-priced car.

According to the reports—some of which come from sources close to the Ford Motor company—Ford plans to sell the new car for approximately \$1,000. The new car, which automobile men believe already has been built at the Ford plant, will not be a Ford nor will it be a Zephyr.

By rumor, the car already has been named the Mercury. It would compete with such makes as Oldsmobile and Buick.

Ford officials are evasive when questioned about the entry of Ford into the medium-priced field. They insist that it will be at least a month or six weeks before they can make any statement on the report.

FARMHAND CAN'T EXPLAIN ATTACK

HILLSBORO, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Dell Clouser, 22, Oreno farm worker, emerged from his coma yesterday but gave officers little help in unravelling the mysterious and brutal attack of Wednesday.

Clouser was found unconscious, cruelly pinioned with wire, one loop of which cinched his mouth shut against a coarse gag.

He said he was attacked in the farm machine shed by two men, neither of whom he knew. He said he had no money and could not explain the attack.
