

LIVESTOCK SALE, FAIR AND PARADE OF 4-H CLUB BEST

18,000 Pounds of Baby
Beef Sold—Large Crowd
Attends Show.

A record crowd, prize stock and competitive bidding brought to a close yesterday one of the best 4-H club livestock fairs and auction sales that has ever been held in Medford.

The livestock parade, consisting of all classes of animals, marched through town at 10:30, led by the high school girls drum corp, and extended from Front street to Riverside. Many people were out to see the parade.

More than 700 people were out to witness the presentation of special awards to the outstanding 4-H club exhibitors at 1:30. The presentation of these awards preceded the auction sale which brought a gross return of more than \$4,000 to the Jackson county club members.

The grand champion fat baby beef which was selected just before the auction sale was sold to the Safeway stores for 22½ cents a pound live weight. This steer was an Aberdeen Angus, belonging to Marvin Poyer of Ashland and bred by C. V. Barton. The champion Hereford steer, bred and owned by Louis Walch of Brownsboro sold to the Safeway stores also for the price of 35 cents a pound live weight.

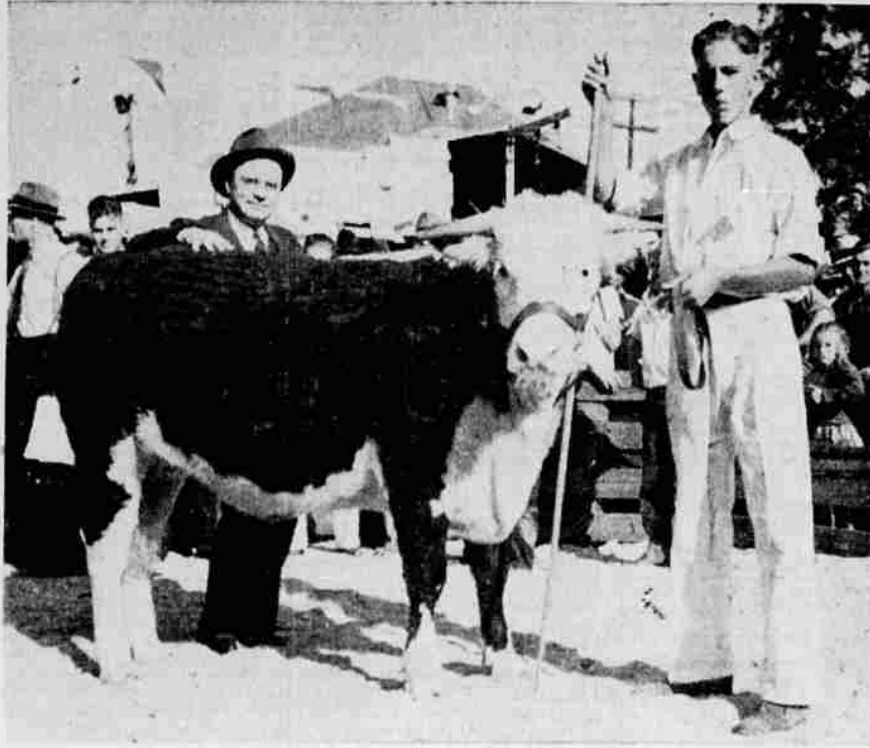
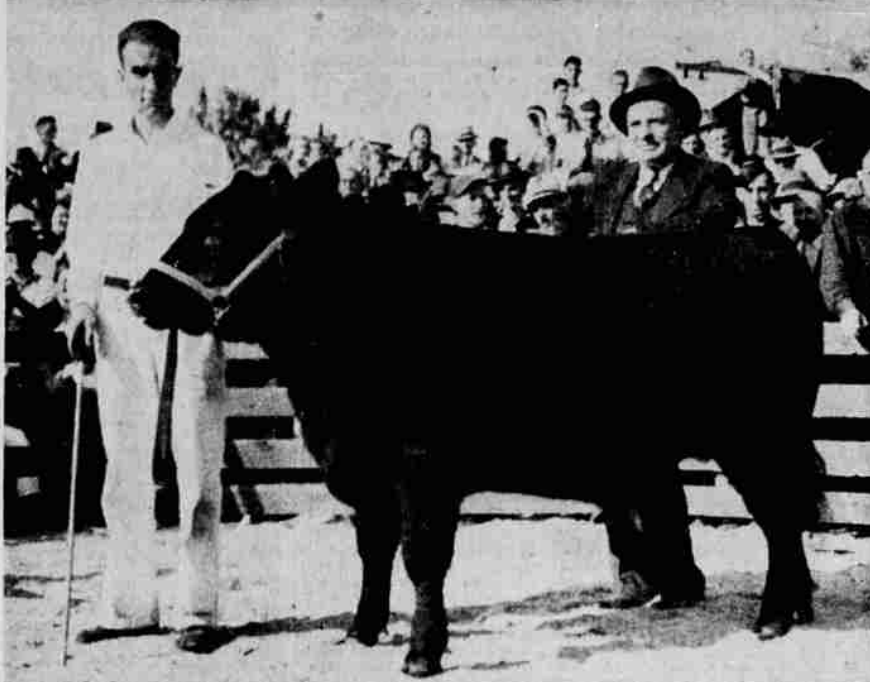
The first prize junior Angus owned by Don Pruitt of Little Butte sold to Con DeVore for 17½ cents. The first prize junior Hereford, owned by Lee Damon of Lake Creek, sold to Gates Groceries for 20 cents a pound. Second prize senior Angus sold to Lumans market for 19 cents a pound. It was owned by Melvin Poyer of Ashland.

More than 18,000 pounds of baby beef were sold to the buyers for more than \$3,000 with an average price of 16.7 cents per pound live weight. The champion fat lamb, owned by Patty von der Hellen of Antelope, was sold to John Perl for 10 cents per pound. The average price for the 13 head of lambs was 8½ cents.

The champion fat barrow, owned by Bob Dunn of Bellview, was purchased by the Safeway stores for 10 cents a pound live weight. Bill Gates purchased the champion pen of four market hogs owned by Ivan Myers of Table Rock for 9½ cents per pound.

The auction sale was considered a success by all those connected with it and the buyers are to be commended on the spirit they showed in their bidding. More than 70 head of prize stock were sold through the auction ring by Col. A. H. Dudley

DEATH SENTENCE METED TOPARMAN

AUBURN, Calif., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Everett Gilbert Parman, 28, Roseville truck driver, was ordered into court next Tuesday to hear himself sentenced to die for the murder of George McElroy, 20, former student body president of Placer Junior College.

A Superior Court jury was out only five minutes yesterday before returning with a verdict finding Parman sane. This made the death sentence mandatory. The same jury the previous day had convicted Parman of murder without recommendation of leniency.

McElroy was shot last July 16 in Roseville. Parman claimed the shooting was accidental. It occurred after McElroy had accused him of attacking McElroy's sister-in-law, 21-year-old Margaret Bruso.

(Parman has kin living in this county.)

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BANCROFT FOE OF \$30 WEEK DREAM VISITS IN CITY

A warning to Oregonians that the \$30-a-week plan coming before California voters in November would wreck the state's finance if adopted, had been left in Medford today by Philip Bancroft, California Republican Senatorial nominee.

Bancroft, who is opposing the "Ham and Eggs" plan in his campaign for the United States Senate, swung through Southern Oregon in traveling from Crescent City to Yreka in a speaking tour of Northern California.

Bancroft is a farm owner from Walnut Creek, Calif., and is the son of the famous historian, Hubert Howe Bancroft, who wrote the histories of Oregon and other Western states.

This is his first venture into politics, and in a surprise vote he upset the old-line politicians to secure the G. O. P. nomination. His opponent is an advocate of the "Ham and Eggs" pension scheme.

"The \$30-a-week plan will be defeated by the California voters in November," Bancroft predicted. "If it should carry it probably will wreck the state."

"I have always favored liberal old-age pensions, and if a plan were devised under which old people would get 30 dollars in real money every week, I would favor it."

"But under this plan the people won't get 30 dollars, but 30 warrants—and when they come to try to cash those warrants, they won't be worth 30 cents."

"The warrants are not redeemable by the state until the old people have paid up a total of \$104 in real money to buy stamps for them, and then the state will only give them back \$1."

Mrs. Emma Francis Boggs, 70, pioneer resident of Jackson county who was born at Gold Hill February 22, 1868, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles E. Rose in southwest Medford at 1 a. m. Saturday.

Mrs. Boggs was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Rhoden, pioneers, and has spent her entire lifetime in this county. She was married in the old United States Hotel at Jacksonville 46 years ago to Alfred Boggs who passed away in 1934.

She leaves three children, Arthur H. Boggs, John A. and Mary Rose, all of Medford. One brother, resides at Gold Hill, Albert Rhoden. She also leaves six grand children.

Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel at 2 p. m. Monday with Dr. Sherman L. Divine officiating. Interment in the Jacksonville cemetery.
