

BETTY LUE REICH AND MARVIN POYER 4-H CLUB WINNERS

Ashland Lad and Oak Grove Lass Named County Champions—Get Portland Trip.

Chosen as the outstanding 4-H club boy and girl in Jackson county by a local judging committee, Betty Lue Reich of Oak Grove Community and Marvin Poyer of Ashland, will go to Portland as guests of the First National Bank of Portland for three days during the Pacific International Livestock Exposition. They were selected as winners from this county in the third annual 4-H club Achievement and Leadership contest sponsored by the state-wide banking institution among the 25,000 club members in Oregon.

Two club members from every county in the state are being named as winners this week through H. C. Seymour, state club director, in charge of judging and awards. Together with two winners from the City of Portland, the 72 county members will convene in Portland October 5, 6 and 7. Heightened interest and personal achievement among 4-H club members have made this year's selection a difficult task, according to the local judging committee, composed of D. Conrad, county club agent, C. R. Bowman, county school superintendent, and Eugene Thorndike, manager of the Medford branch of the First National Bank of Portland.

Miss Reich, member of Oak Grove 4-H club, directed by Mrs. Iva Thomas, Mrs. Bertie Parish and Mrs. Fred Reich, was announced winner among girls for her work in cooking, clothing, canning, judging and demonstrations.

As recognition of his activity in dairy, swine, beef, corn and other projects for the past nine years, Marvin Poyer was chosen from among boys of this county. He is a member of the Bellview 4-H club under the leadership of Dick Joy.

Awards include transportation and all other expenses during the visit to Portland which is being arranged by officers of the First National bank of Portland. The 74 guests will follow a three-day program which will include attendance at the Pacific International Livestock exposition, sight-seeing tours of Portland, special luncheons, an evening at the home show, banquets and a dance. Mr. Thorndike states that every detail of the visit has been arranged by the bank to insure complete comfort and safety of its 4-H guests. "We consider it a distinct privilege to honor these young people who are proving themselves exceptional in character and leadership through the fine 4-H movement," he added.

MUSSOLINI URGES ENGLAND, FRANCE TO DESERT CZECHS

VERONA, Italy, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini today advised France and Britain to save Europe from war by leaving Czechoslovakia to her fate. He suggested in a speech before 47,000 fascists that he was entirely averse, since Czechoslovakia perhaps would recognize the futility of fighting Germany alone.

He implied he saw no reason for resistance to Reichsfuehrer Hitler's demands. "The German memorandum does not deviate from the line which was approved at the London meeting," he declared, referring to Hitler's Godenberg memorandum and the Anglo-French proposals previously submitted to the Prague government.

"There are still several days to reach a peaceful solution," he said. "If this is not achieved, it is almost beyond human power to prevent a conflict."

Directing his speech at Italy's "adversaries," he declared "a new Europe" might be created this week. He said Italy stood for a "new Europe" which would replace the "dying one" constructed at Versailles.

"It is useless for diplomats to try to save Versailles," he asserted. "The Europe which was constructed at Versailles—very often with colonial ignorance of geography and history—this Versailles is dying. Its fate will be decided this week."

"It is during this week that a new Europe may rise up. This will be a Europe of justice for all persons and of reconciliation among people."

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ESCAPES TO FACE TRIALS, 2 STATES

PORTLAND, Sept. 26.—(AP)—J. Douglas Swensen, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Oregon, said today Robert E. Rule, 34, fugitive with two others from Pocatello, Idaho, where they escaped from jail, will be prosecuted first in Oregon for the alleged robbery and terrorization of a Bandon, Ore., druggist, and his wife.

Rule was captured here Saturday by federal agents as he entered a government building. With James O. Wayne and Robert C. Bowersox, he was alleged to have robbed Otto Schindler, Bandon druggist, last August 31, a few days after he, Bowersox and Wayne had fled the Idaho jail.

Wayne and Bowersox are in jail at Coquille, Ore., awaiting trial on the Bandon robbery charges and Rule will be tried with them. Upon disposition of the Oregon charges, the Idaho counts will be pressed.

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LIONS BACK BLIND-MAN'S ENTERPRISE

John Ragsdale of Eagle Point today began his second week in a business set up for him in the Medford postoffice through the cooperation of the federal and state governments and the local Lions' club in a program to help the blind to help themselves.

Mr. Ragsdale is operating a stand where newspapers, periodicals, cigarettes and confections may be purchased. The first week of business was considered successful and today the Lions club urged continued public support of the enterprise.

Through an act of congress, federal buildings have been opened to the establishment of such enterprises by the blind. Through the cooperation of the state and the Lions clubs, nine such enterprises have now been established in Oregon. Mr. Ragsdale's being the latest.

Seven of the nine set up in Oregon are already self-sustaining, the Lions club here reported. As returns justify, the blind persons set up in the business repay the Lions club for their preliminary financing.

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
