History in High

ONE thing is certain,—history is being made these days. And how one sensation follows another,—one big scene the second. The world is certainly a stage,—a revolving stage,—the situation changing from hour to hour like a cosmic kaleidoscope, on a fly-wheel.

TWENTY-FOUR hours ago, for example, war appeared CERTAIN. Premier Chamberlain gave an eloquent and moving speech to the world, but as far as world peace was concerned, its keynote was hopelessness.

Then last night, President Roosevelt pulled another surprise,—sent a second peace appeal, this time addressed to Der Fuehrer personally and exclusively.

President Roosevelt has sent out many messages, but we doubt if any will rank higher in the history of American diplomacy than the one dispatched last night.

So hope revived again, particularly when one pondered that phrase which while appealing to Der Fuehrer's pride and sense of power; at the same time, made his personal responsibility for the war if it did come,—for the death and horror and destruction,—inescapable.

AND now this morning—whether as a result of that message from the President or not,—we have a scene enacted in the British Parliament which for sheer drama in the grand manner, makes Cecil de Mille, look like a side-show barker, at a 3 ring circus.

Just as Premier Chamberlain was concluding his formal and discouraging report on the "state of the nation," a note was handed him,—there was a moment of tense silence,—then a sudden luminous change came over the face of the British leader, an electric shock seemed to pass over the hushed assembly and raising one hand in the air, the Premier announced an invitation had been received for him to meet Hitler, Deladier and Mussolini at the suggestion of the latter, in Munich! And needless to say, he would go,—he would go if need be to the ends of the earth,—to fight for the cause of world peace.

YEA verily, another big scene, and one that in the twinkling of an eye changed the entire world situation.

Talk about your last minute reprieve from the Governor, as Spencer Tracy is about to enter the lethal chamber,—here two minutes before the hour set for Hitler to march, the entire world listening for the sound of the first gun,—the British Premier is summoned to an 11th hour conference, by a world figure who had scarcely appeared to date in the dramatic personae,—and the most colorful and theatrical of them all,—"Iron pants" Benito Mussolini!

Mussolini Has the Key

WHAT will come out of this Munich conference, peace or war? From this distance it looks as though the outcome will depend entirely upon Mussolini.

If Benito sides with Adolph, there will be a deadlock, the two great European democracies, against the two great dictators. If he doesn't, if he earnestly seeks a workable compromise, or openly sides with Chamberlain and Daladier, then a decision against war will be certain,—the democracies will win.

What would one give to have an ear to the key hole of that conference room, or the rights on a dictaphone! Certainly there history is being made with a vengeance.

If War Comes ---

IF THERE is another world war, that verse might well be pasted in every American hat. For it's the truth and a consoling thing to remember.

War, not only does things to the BODIES of those who fight, but to the MINDS of those who don't.

And war brings its flood of propaganda from both sides. The search for what is true and the refusal to accept statements until there is PROOF to sustain them, therefore, should appeal to all right-minded people if war comes.
