

STATE ATTORNEYS, JUDGE'S PENSIONS, RETIREMENT PLAN

SALEM, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Two proposed laws providing for retirement of supreme court and circuit judges were discussed today by the Oregon state bar...

One law would provide voluntary retirement of judges who have reached the age of 70 and who served 10 years, or physically disabled judges who served 15 years.

The other proposal called for retirement of supreme court judges at 70 and circuit court judges at 65, 10 years' service being required for both classes.

This morning the 42 newly admitted members of the bar were given their oath in the supreme court chamber by Chief Justice Henry J. Bean.

Albert E. Stephan, Portland, regional attorney for the Interstate Commerce Commission, traded the growth of federal fact-finding boards, such as the ICC and national labor relations board, asserting the people demanded the creation of boards because of dissatisfaction with the courts.

Late today the bar members will discuss the Wagner labor relations act.

RIGHT HAND MAN THANKS FUEHRER

RAYREUTH, Germany, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Konrad Henlein, leader of the Sudeten German party, today sent a telegram to Reichsfuehrer Hitler calling him a "deliverer" of 3,500,000 Sudeten Germans.

"In the name of Sudeten Germanism, tormented and oppressed for 80 years, I thank you, my Fuehrer, from a deeply moved heart for the freedom which you have won for us by fighting," the message said.

Henlein on September 15 issued a proclamation calling for German annexation of Czechoslovakia's Sudetenland and on the same day the Prague government ordered his arrest on a charge of treason.

He fled into Germany and announced organization of the Sudeten free corps, irregular soldiers, to harass Czechoslovak authorities along the border. On September 16 the Sudeten German party was outlawed in Czechoslovakia.

NIGHTMARE CAUSE OF SHOOTING TOT

FRANKFORT, Ky., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Ballard Rucker, Jr., 9, was fatally wounded today, Patrolman Guy Wainwright said, by a pistol bullet fired by his stepfather, George Taylor, during the course of a nightmare.

The bullet passed through the wall separating the rooms in which they were sleeping.

Shocked into consciousness by the pistol's report and the child's screams, Taylor summoned medical aid and had the youth rushed to a hospital. An emergency operation was unavailing. Death was attributed to excessive bleeding.

Taylor told officers he dreamed he heard a noise in the house and, before regaining consciousness, fired the pistol which he keeps at his bedside.
