It's Coach George Harrington's fast-improving Medford junior high school griders versus the heavier and more experienced Central Point high school Pointers of Coach Ken Hulbert.

It's at the high school stadium here, under the bright arena lights and on the fine, green turf. It starts at 8 o'clock sharp, and upwards of 1000 customers are expected to view proceedings.

Pre-game dope points to the Pointers, big and tough and rugged. It's after a hard struggle, but upsets are the rule rather than the exception those football days, and the local juniors are girded to the teeth to upset the appreciat of Hulbert's gang.

Last year the score was 28 to 0 for Central Point. This season, Coach Harrington has brought his club along rapidly until right now it is practically in mid-season form. The juniors dropped a 7 to 0 verdict to Jacksonville high last week, but looked good in doing it. The future Black Torchard variety figures to reach a red-hot stage tonight and toss plenty of razzle-dazzle at the Pointers.

This will be the unveiling of Coach Hulbert's 1938 grid creation. The team has drilled steadily for two weeks, and is in great shape for its opening clash. The mentor says the outfit is as good, if not better, than last year's fine team.

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BIRD SEASON TO START TOMORROW IN UPSTATE AREA

Jackson and Josephine Counties to See Opening October 15.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Brisk fall air and sniffling bird dogs heralded today the approach of the upland bird season tomorrow on pheasants, valley quail and bobwhite.

Arthur S. Einarson, biological survey field expert at Oregon state college, said shotgun fans should enjoy good hunting, particularly those seeking pheasants. An excellent crop was reared last summer.

The pheasant season by counties: October 1-15—Klamath, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Wheeler, Umatilla, Wallowa, Union, Baker, Grant, Crook and Deschutes.

October 1-10—Douglas, Clatsop, Columbia, Washington, Coos, Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Lane, Linn, Marion, Clackamas and Multnomah.

October 15-31—Jackson and Josephine.

October 10-31—Malheur. Bag limits ranged from two cocks in one day, but not more than four during 10-day season in some counties to four in one day and not more than eight in a week in others.

The season on Hungarian partridges will be opened in a few counties.

The season on California or valley quail and bobwhites—limit of 10 in any seven consecutive days, follows:

October 1-15—Klamath, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Grant, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union and Lake.

October 1-10—Douglas, Clatsop, Columbia, Washington, Tillamook, Coos, Curry, Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Linn, Marion, Clackamas, Multnomah and Lincoln.

October 15-31—Jackson and Josephine.

November 1-30—Deschutes, Crook and Jefferson.

CONFIDENT CUBS, WITH GABBY HURT, MEET CARDINALS

By CHARLES DUNKLEY CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Charles Leo Hartnett, making baseball history with the Chicago Cubs, today had his rumpaging players fired with the spirit of stretching their winning streak to 13 games in a row by taking the remaining three games of the season from the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Cubs are convinced the National league championship is theirs. Beating Pittsburgh 10 to 1 yesterday to achieve their tenth straight victory and their 20th in the last 23 games put the Cubs a game and one half ahead of the Pirates who came to Chicago in three place just four days ago.

Manager Hartnett, his Irish face tomato red with excitement, was as happy as a school kid as he entered the Cubs' clubhouse after yesterday's victory, the third straight over the Pirates.

Hartnett was grinning from ear to ear, even though the 19-year-old had wrapped around the torn third finger on his right hand was streaked with blood.

Because of Gabby's injury—suffered on a foul tip in the ninth inning, the players, at first, were a bit downcast but Hartnett laughed it off. The injury may keep Gabby out of two games.

It was the third time this year Hartnett had been sidelined by injuries. Early this season a ball hit the left wrist, and on August 15 he fractured his right thumb to be laid up for a month.

Bill Lee, who turned in an "iron man" performance by pitching for the fourth consecutive day, made no effort to hide the fact he was a weary pitcher. Because of a tight and tired arm, he said, he couldn't pitch his natural way and had to force himself, which cost him control. Lee chalked up his 22nd victory against nine defeats in 40 games.

Gloom as thick as pea soup engulfed the Pirates' dressing room as Hartnett's steam-roller had finished its job. Three of the four Pirate pitchers, Russ Bauers, Cy Blanton, and Ed Brandt, didn't even wait for the finish of the game. They dressed and departed in the seventh inning, each shaking his head in a manner that plainly bespoke their doubts that the once proud Pirates would get back to first place.

Neither the Cubs nor the Pirates boasts such a brace of hotshots, though both have good pitching and the Cubs figure to do a lot of damage with Bill Lee and Gay Bryant if they qualify for the big doings. Lee, with 22 wins and 9 losses, and Bryant with 19 and 11, have been pitching phenomenal ball during the Cubs' stretch drive. Only thing, they are bound to be getting tired, and if the National league race is not decided before Sunday they will go into the series wobbling around like sleepwalkers. They are the only sure bets the Cubs have, notwithstanding Dizzy Dean's good showing against the Pirates three days ago.

The Pirates own three top pitchers in Bob Klinger, Jim Tobin and Russ Bauers, a very useful game-mover in Mace Brown, and valuable supporting strength in Cy Blanton, Red Lucas and Ed Brandt. It probably is the best balanced staff of the lot, yet it lacks a really great pitcher, or one with world series experience. This last is important.

GOMEZ SLATED TO HURL FIRST GAME; RUFFING IN HOLE

(This is the last of a series comparing the potential rivals in the approaching world series.)

By GAYLE TALBOT NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The New York Yankees, seeking to break all precedent by winning their third straight world series, will go into action against either the Chicago Cubs or Pittsburgh Pirates next Wednesday firing the same double-barreled shotgun that has moved down the Giants in the last two autumn arguments.

First, Manager Joe McCarthy will explode Vernon (Lefty) Gomez at the National league batters, and then he will pull the other trigger, Rufus (Red) Ruffing. If the enemy survives the twin blast and the mopping-up operations of assorted other Yankee pitchers and still is acting belligerent, then Gomez and Ruffing will be fired again.

That about sums up the Yankee pitching strategy. In Ruffing, who has won 21 and lost 7 this season, and Gomez, with an 18-12 count, the champs own a pair of the great flingers in the game today. Together, they form an incomparable short-series combination. Gomez has won all five world series games he has started. Ruffing has won two and lost one.

With Monte Pearson, the club's third fine pitcher, sick and unlikely to start in the series, and Spud Chandler, sensational young star, out with a bad elbow, it looks like the Yankees will have only their two aces to depend upon.

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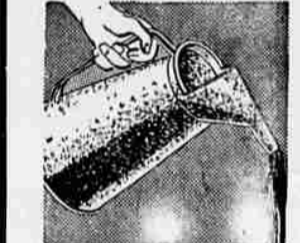

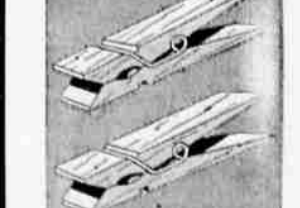
