

JERSEY CHAMPION ON FARM PROGRAM NOON TOMORROW

Dairymen and particularly Jersey breeders of the west will be intensely interested in the National Farm and Home Hour program 12:00 to 12:15 noon, October 3, at which time the Jersey cow, Sybil Tease Lorna, national Jersey champion milk and butterfat producer, will be featured.

The champion will leave that evening for the national dairy show, Columbus, Ohio, as a special American Jersey cattle club exhibit, according to Fieldman T. R. Warren.

Lorna, who has close relatives in many western Jersey herds, is owned by L. A. Hubert of Independence, Oregon. She has already produced more than 1000 pounds of butterfat during the first 298 days of her present lactation, which will end officially October 1. The final official figures will be announced over the air from the Hotel Portland dining room where Lorna is to be presented to the members' forum of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. In addition to the National Farm and Home program, the Pacific International period over KXK or KOW from 1:00 to 1:30 will be used to give additional information regarding the cow that will be first to hold three national Jersey records simultaneously, according to information.

HOME EXTENSION OFFICERS PARLEY HELD ON FRIDAY

The annual officers' training conference for the officers of home extension units of Jackson county was held at the courthouse auditorium September 30 with 58 officers representing 17 units in attendance. The Griffin Creek, Medford and Talent units won attendance honors by having all of their officers, including chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, treasurer and librarian at this meeting.

The purpose of this conference is to acquaint officers of all home extension groups with duties and responsibilities of their respective offices and to discuss methods to be used in conducting business meetings and administering the program.

Mrs. Azalea Sager, state leader of the home economics extension, led the discussion for chairman and vice-chairman. Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, county home demonstration agent, led the discussion on duties of officers for the secretaries, treasurers and librarians. Mrs. G. E. Quarterman, county chairman of the county committee, presided at the morning session and Mrs. Lee Port of Applegate led group singing, accompanied by Mrs. Walter Ricks, of Howard, Mrs. Nor Straus of Sams Valley, member of the county committee, presided at the afternoon session at which Mrs. Lee Port, chairman of the extension committee on the County Women's association of the World discussed the London conference of this association which will be held in June, 1934, and the plans of the county extension committee for sending a delegate from Jackson county.

Mr. I. D. Compton, supervisor of the community sanitation project, explained the project plans and urged community leaders to discuss this project at their local meetings.

Methods of conducting business meetings and general parliamentary procedure were discussed by Mrs. Sager. This was followed by a demonstration meeting held by officers of the meeting adjourned after program announcements by Mabel C. Mack of extension meetings to be held in October.

Out of town guests at the meeting were Miss Nola Welch, home demonstration agent of Josephine county; Mrs. A. B. Jackson of the Josephine county Redwood club and Mrs. Clara A. Smith of the Josephine county Happy Homemakers' club.

The windshield has 26 percent more area, the front door windows 11 percent, the rear doors 2 percent, rear side windows 32 percent and the rear window glass 21 percent.

Externally the cars are noteworthy for their simplicity.
