CALIFORNIA MAN GETS STIFF FINE AS DRUNK DRIVER

Alby Fosselt, 37, of Sacramento, Cal., was fined \$100 and \$4.50 costs and sentenced to 30 days in jail by Judge William R. Coleman in justice of the peace court this morning for operating a car while under the influence of liquor. His operator's license was taken up. He was driving a car with a Florida license.

The jail sentence will be suspended if the fine is paid in full by Saturday. Judge Coleman told Fosselt he paid \$25 of the fine and said he would pay the remainder before Saturday. He pleaded guilty to the charge through his attorney, Victor A. Tengwald.

Fosselt was arrested by state police after he ran his car into a ditch at the junction of the Pacific highway and Kirtland road. Charged with larceny from a store, Homer Williams, 48, an itinerant negro, was given until 9:30 tomorrow morning to plead. He told the court he would plead guilty to a charge of petty larceny, which is a misdemeanor. Larceny from a store is a felony.

Williams is accused of stealing two women's slips valued at \$1.55 from Montgomery Ward's Saturday. He was arrested later on the street by city police when he assertedly was trying to sell the goods. Passing of sentence was deferred in the case of Thomas W. Watson who was charged by his wife with being disorderly in their home on McCandless road yesterday. Watson pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct.
