

COUPLE ACCUSED OF ATTACK UPON DIVORCED WOMAN

Man Allegedly Hit Ex-Wife,
Woman Used Stove Pok-
er, Complaint Says.

Pearl Rhodes, 31, of 121 North Grape street was arraigned in justice of the peace court this morning on a charge of assault while armed with a dangerous weapon and her companion, Glen Huber, 36, Medford, was arraigned on a charge of assault and battery. The two are accused of attacking Huber's divorced wife, Ida Huber, last night.

Judge William R. Coleman said he would set the time later for a preliminary hearing in the Rhodes case and for trial in the Huber case. Representing both defendants, Attorney Victor A. Tengwald demanded a preliminary hearing on the felony charge and asked that setting the time for hearing and trial of the misdemeanor charge be deferred until he could confer with Attorney Charles W. Reames.

Bail was set at \$1,000 in the Rhodes case and \$500 in the Huber case. Asserting that the case involved a "very serious and outrageous attack," District Attorney Newman opposed delay in holding the preliminary hearing and trial. He favored \$1,000 bail in each case. The two defendants spent the night in jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail last night.

District Attorney Newman said that while looking for Mr. Huber to collect an alimony payment last night, Ida Huber saw her former husband and Miss Rhodes pass in an automobile. She followed them to Miss Rhodes' home where she asked for some money of Mr. Huber, the district attorney said. The conversation, he stated, took place in the yard of the residence.

After asking for the money, Ida Huber was beaten by Mr. Huber and was struck across the head by Miss Rhodes with an iron stove poker which she procured in her home, Mr. Newman asserted. Ida Huber was treated at a hospital for a scalp wound and was then taken home, he added.

Ida Huber was not in court this morning. The alleged attack occurred about 8:30 last night, it was said. Miss

ANNUAL PAYMENT ROAD BONDS MADE

Payment of \$63,000 on the old Pacific highway bond issue was announced today by County Treasurer Ralph E. Sweeney. The annual payment is due November 1.

The bonds, in the principal amount of \$500,000 were issued in November, 1913, to pay the county's share of the original Pacific highway. The bonds bear interest of 5 percent. After the current payment, there will still be \$80,000 outstanding, Mr. Sweeney said.

COMMUNITY CHEST CAMPAIGN STARTS, CLOSES SATURDAY

Funds Sought for 1939
Welfare Work—Work of
Salvation Army Cited.

With the slogan "Your Neighbors Need Your Help," the 1938 Community Chest campaign opened today. The drive will end on October 8. During this five-day period, field workers will canvass the community to raise the funds necessary to carry on welfare work for the next year. It will be an intensive campaign and the cooperation of all is asked in order to reach the goal by next Saturday so that the participating agencies may make their plans for the coming year.

Persons desiring to contribute without being solicited may leave or send their contributions to Community Chest headquarters, 125 East Main street. All are asked to be generous in helping their neighbors.

Participating agencies are performing a vital work in the community, said O. O. Alexander, campaign manager. He cited the work done by the Salvation Army, a brief resume of which for the year ended August 31 follows:

Families given garments, 156; total number of garments given away, 456; pairs of shoes given away, 58; families given groceries, 65; families given furniture, 6; transportation provided, 17; families having their rent paid, 1.

Meals provided transient persons needing help, 4,115; beds provided, 2,468; garments to transients, 122; shoes to transients, 42 pairs. Relief cases interviewed, 2,333; requests for workers, 134; jobs provided, 99; baskets given away to needy families at Christmas, 137; children receiving Christmas toys, 351.

In addition the Salvation Army carries on an extensive religious service designed primarily to salvage human life. Here, as elsewhere, the Salvation Army operates a Young People's club which provides recreational facilities under trained leadership for underprivileged boys and girls. The club is operated for the physical, mental and spiritual development of youth.

TAYLOR GRANTED UNTIL FEB. 1 TO CLEAN UP TREES

Thomas L. Taylor until February 1 to clean the remainder of his Central Point pear orchard of blight was entered yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton in the case of Taylor versus a number of state and county agricultural officials.

Taylor seeks a permanent injunction restraining the officials from cutting out the rest of his orchard, about 2½ acres. About six acres had been cut out when the court proceedings were instituted.

The court also ordered that after February 1 a further hearing be held regarding the condition of the orchard and the individual trees then and that thereupon a final decree may be entered properly disposing of all the issues in the case as well as those that have developed subsequent to the filing of the suit by reason of the removal of various blight conditions existing in the orchard.

The interlocutory order recommended that the pruning, cutting or other methods employed in removing blight be done in accordance with suggestions and upon the further inspection of the orchard by Prof. F. C. Reimer, superintendent of the southern Oregon experiment station.

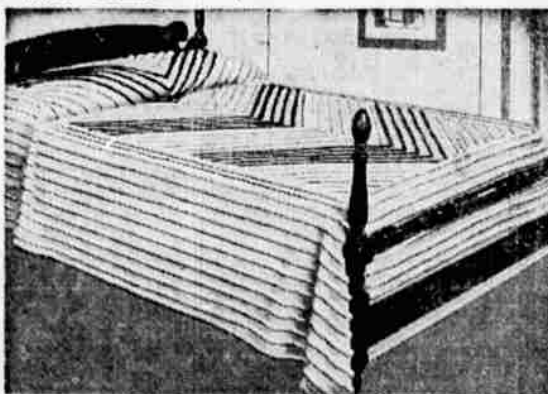
