PARIS — (UP) — The answer to "What kind of sleeves will be the style this fall?" is as difficult to answer as an international economic problem! For each house of "haute couture" is advocating a different sleeve; and thus each and all will be fashionably correct.

Generally speaking, there is a tendency toward less fullness at the shoulder. Padded and much-tucked shoulders gave way in most collections to plain, smoothly fitting shoulders—especially true, of course, for sports clothes. Schiaparelli, however, clings to the built-up shoulder in many of her new daytime models; so think twice before remodeling your last year's suit.

The "poor working girl," whose typewriter desk is hard on cuffs and elbows, will be glad to hear that short sleeves—to the elbow, or even shorter—are an outstanding characteristic of many winter models. Madeleine Vionet leans almost exclusively to this short sleeve, from heavy wool street dresses to fine wool crepe dinner dresses. In most cases the sleeve is wide and loose, often being set in the shoulder with considerable fullness but no padding or stiffening artifices.

This bound-to-be-popular short sleeve is set in low on the shoulder, as are most sleeves of all kinds. In order to attract attention to this wider shoulder, sleeve seams are frequently emphasized by braid, narrow strips of leather or ribbon, or even fringe.

# PAPERHANGER AT EUGENE, FUGITIVE

PORTLAND, Oct. 4.—(P)—J. Douglas Swenson, federal bureau of investigation agent, announced today Raymond Dale Kramer, 35, indicted for a West Virginia slaying four years ago, was arrested at Eugene.

Swenson said Kramer, alias Bill Johnson, was accused of shooting James Gillis at Terra Alta, W. Va., in November 1934. The agent asserted Raymond Tents, who received a life sentence, said he and Kramer shot and killed Gillis, who was known to have carried a considerable sum of money. Tests related they fled in Kramer's automobile, the officer said.

Swenson revealed that federal agents received a tip that a Bill Johnson, Eugene paperhanger, might be Kramer. Johnson was taken into custody last night, Swenson said, and his fingerprints tallied with those of Kramer.

# HITLER 'KEEPS UP TRIUMPHANT TOUR OF SUDETENLAND'

KARLSBAH (Karlov Vary), Sudetenland, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler, making a triumphant tour of his newly annexed Sudeten territory, told an electrified Sudeten German audience today "I didn't know how I would sometime get here, but I did know I would come."

Speaking only a short distance from where Sudeten leader Konrad Henlein last April 24 formulated his famous eight demands, the Fuehrer said:

"For 30 years you remained faithful to your Volkstum (racial nationalism)."

"And this Germany is just as proud of you Sudeten Germans. In this hour we can do nothing else than think about our eternal German people and our German Reich."
