Taxi Hearing — A hearing was held at the Jackson county courthouse today by the state public utility commission on an application of Fuzzy's Taxicab for an "anywhere for hire" permit. Such a permit is required for operation beyond the three-mile city limit. This was a continuation of a hearing begun on the same application in Salem. The application is opposed by the Yellow Cab company. The hearing was conducted by Donald J. Burke, chief examiner for the public utility commission. Glenn Foster, a secretary of the commission, was reporter for the hearing.

Gets Jail Term — Homer Williams, 44, a transient Negro, was sentenced to 45 days in jail by Judge William R. Coleman in justice of the peace court this morning when he pleaded guilty to a charge of petty larceny. The charge was reduced from larceny in a store when Williams said he would plead guilty to the misdemeanor. District Attorney Frank J. Newman said the trivial nature of the theft warranted a reduction from the felony charge. Williams was accused of stealing two women's slips valued at \$1.58 from Montgomery Ward's last Saturday after he had promised City Judge Allen D. Curry he would leave town following his arrest for drunkenness. Williams said he did not leave town because he was still under the influence of "chemical wine" when he was released from city jail. "I got along fine and dandy if I could only leave that chemical wine alone," he told Judge Coleman. Mr. Newman said Williams appeared to have no previous record except for petty charges of vagrancy and drunkenness, but added that his record would be carefully checked while he is in jail.

Fall From Roof Injures Demmer — Paul Demmer, 51, of 879 Franquette street was taken to Sacred Heart hospital this morning suffering from a broken back and side injuries sustained when he fell about 12 feet from the roof of the residence of Harold A. Bither at 1020 North Central avenue. Mr. Demmer's attending physician said no bones were broken, and that his injuries were apparently not serious.

The accident occurred while Demmer was painting the roof. He evidently slipped on the roof, and before he could catch himself he tumbled to the ground. He struck a clothesline before landing on the ground on his side. The force of the fall was broken considerably by the line.

Following the accident, he was taken to his home, and from there transferred to the hospital in the Peri ambulance.

The 14 subscribed to the oath of allegiance read by H. S. Kenyon, deputy clerk, whereupon they were admitted to citizenship by Judge Claude McCulloch.

Patriotic exercises were held in the courtroom by Crater Lake chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, for the benefit of the new citizens. Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, chairman of the American committee, presided. Mrs. Bert B. Lowry, regent, gave a brief address and presented small American flags to each new citizen. Mrs. J. H. Cochran, past regent, recited the George Washington prayer.

JURY PICKED FOR FEDERAL ACTION

Many Resolutions

Nearly 100 resolutions, including one attacking the reconstruction finance corp. for reputed loans to employers paying sub-standard wages, were under consideration today by committee of the American Federation of Labor's annual convention.

The Brotherhood of Operative Potters submitted the resolution censuring the HPC's loan policies. It proposed to federation's officers either demand removal of HPC officials or seek "legislation which will prevent chicanery of labor."

Chairman of the statehoods obtaining loans of federal funds. Chairman of the HPC is Jesse Jones, one of Houston's leading business men.

The potters complained loans were made to employers who refused their workers the right of collective bargaining and refuse to pay their workers the minimum wages which prevail in such industry.

Informed officials said the resolution was aimed at the pottery industry.

Another resolution, it was reported, asked the convention to instruct federation officers to oppose senate confirmation of Donald Wakefield Smith's reappointment to the national labor relations board.
