YOUNG SECRETARY GIVES STORY OF RUM DEATH PARTY

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Miss Rose Fields, young secretary of the FPA office here, was called as a witness today in the preliminary hearing of two men on manslaughter charges for the mysterious hotel room death of Walter C. Vibert, 46, executive of the federal housing administration, but testified "I turned my head" when blows were struck.

She said she saw White hit Vibert on the jaw with his open hand, and then Andrews struck him on the chest and stomach. Then she said she turned her head.
