Begin Filming Of Medford News Reel With School Views

Yesterday marked the beginning of the filming of The Mail Tribune Medford newsreel.

One of the first big scenes which will be used in making up this local news attraction was filmed on Main street as the Senior High school girls' pep band paraded through the business district heralding the first big football game of the season to be played tonight by the Medford Tigers and the Roseburg Indians, at the high school field. Early this morning the again found the cameramen on the job erecting the elaborate motion picture and sound equipment on the corner of Main and Central, and was all prepared to film the surfer-pine pep parade as they passed the all-seeing lens of the camera.

Several hundred people gathered around the four corners of the intersection to watch the "shooting" and it is hoped that too much attention was not directed to the filming of the picture to the detriment of the purpose of the parade.

Already many plans have been made for the shooting of local organizations which will be included in The Mail Tribune newsreel when it is presented on the screen at the Rialto Theater Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, October 18, 19, 20, in conjunction with the presentation of Medford's first all-sound local movie, "Runnin' Wild."

The director, in charge of the production of the local attraction spent much time discussing with Mrs. Harry Prentice the possibility of featuring the Southern Oregon Accordion band which, it is understood, is composed of 50 talented accordion players. This band, it is said, will be one of the featured attractions at the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association-convention to be held next week in Ashland, and many of their solo players have been invited to record their talent on the stage of the Rialto theater next Tuesday and Wednesday nights, when sound and picture will be held for the purpose of selecting talent for "Runnin' Wild."

C. G. Smith, principal of the Medford Senior high school, is lending his co-operation in aiding the producer select some of the principal dramatic players who will be seen on the screen in this local attraction. Wilson Watts, musical director of the high school, and other members of the faculty in touch with the better dramatic and vocal talent of the school, have also offered their co-operation in making this all-Medford picture a real success from the standpoint of talent.
