

STATE INSURANCE BUILDING TALKED NEAR STATEHOUSE

SALEM, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Tentative plans for construction of a state industrial accident insurance building, to be located opposite the capitol and the new state library building, were made here today.

The new structure would face the plaza opposite the library. The rear of the building would be on Capitol street.

The building also would house the public utilities commissioner's office and the unemployment compensation commission. It would cost less than \$1,000,000.

Funds of the industrial accident commission would be used to pay the original cost, but this would be repaid by rents charged to the public utilities commissioner and the unemployment compensation commission.

Title to the building would remain with the industrial accident commission until it is paid for, when the state would gain title.

The public utilities commissioner now is paying rent to a private property owner downtown. The unemployment compensation commission is paying rent to the Salem school district, it being located in the old high school.

"This new building," an authoritative source said, "would result in all state activities in Salem being housed in state-owned buildings."

"Funds of the industrial accident commission would not really be spent, because this money would be repaid by rentals. In effect, the plan would give the state a new building for nothing, since rents now being paid to outside sources would be used for construction."

"We probably will ask the 1939 legislature for permission to construct it, although we don't think that is absolutely necessary."

Members of the industrial accident commission were not available for comment.

MORE STATE LAND WILL BE USED AS WATERFOWL AREAS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The bureau of biological survey disclosed today it acquired or began to acquire an additional 1121 acres for bird refuges in Oregon during fiscal 1938. Of this area, 320 acres were to be included in the Blitzen unit and 488 acres in the Malheur unit of the Malheur-migratory bird refuge in Harney county. The remaining 313 acres were to be incorporated in the Willamette migratory waterfowl refuge in Marion county. The survey previously had acquired 159,086 acres for the Malheur refuge. Principal species using the Malheur reserve, officials said, were redheads, ruddy ducks, mallards, gadwalls, cinnamon teal, pintails, shovellers, blue-winged teal, Canada geese, snow geese, long-billed curlew, Wilson's snipe, avocet, western willet, Wilson's phalarope, spotted sandpiper, sandhill cranes, white pelicans, black and Forster's terns, California and ring-billed gulls, egrets, black-crowned night and Treganza's herons, white-faced glossy ibises and various grebes.

The refuge also has been used by mule deer, antelope, beaver, raccoon, mink and muskrat. In addition to the Malheur and Willamette refuges, there are seven other federal migratory bird and waterfowl reserves in the state—Cape Meares in Willamette and Meridian counties, Cold Springs in Umatilla county, Goat Island in Curry county, Lower Klamath in Klamath county, McKay creek in Umatilla county, Three Arch Rocks in Tillamook county and Upper Klamath in Klamath county.
