er than they were in 1937. We are appealing also to those who can afford just a small contribution. No sum is too small. We need the small contributions as well as the large ones to make the campaign a success.

"We are faced with a serious problem that only the Community Chest can solve. It is a community problem and so we feel confident that everyone in the community is willing to make a trifling financial sacrifice to carry on this necessary public welfare program."

Those who have not yet been contacted will receive a call from a solicitor but meantime it is urged that contributions be sent voluntarily to or left at Community Chest headquarters, 125 East Main street, Mr. Hogan said. The telephone number is 789.

Four more Medford firms were added to the 100 per cent honor roll yesterday. They were The Pastime, Bursillon's, Huxon's and the American Laundry. This brings the number of Medford honor-roll firms to 33.

Eleven firms of Central Point have been credited with 100 per cent subscription to the chest. They are Hatfield's, Faber's grocery, Faber's Clothing store, Faber's Feed store, Jones grocery, Recorder Guy Tex, Giesse's shop, A. E. Powell (The American), Stone's Drug store, Postoffice, and the Pendleton gas station.

The Boy Scouts of America, a participating agency in the Community Chest, was described by O. O. Alender, campaign director, as an organization which prepares the youth of today as the citizens and leaders of tomorrow.

"The organization has three objectives: to build character, to train our youth to become good citizens and to develop leadership," Mr. Alender said. "These objectives are achieved by giving our boys a constructive program under good leadership during their leisure time."

"As a preventive of juvenile delinquency, the Boy Scout organization excels. Each city, county and state penal institution as well as the national reformatories and prisons are but monuments to neglected youth. It is easier to build men than to mend them."

Speaking of the Girl Scouts, another participating agency, Mr. Alender said the organization provides a kind of group experience which is democratic and pervaded with ideals of womanhood and citizenship.

The program is fitted to the individual girl and leaders in Girl Scouting are instructed that the girl is more important than the work, Mr. Alender related.

"Girl Scouts engage in a multiple of useful activities," Mr. Alender stated. "Each troop has an individual project, such as making scrapbooks for the local hospitals, sending monthly magazines, cookies, fruits and similar things to aged shut-ins, and delivering Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets for welfare agencies to the needy. Each month the troops report on community service."

"This is all highly desirable work that can be carried on only through the Community Chest. That is the purpose of the Community Chest, community service. Let us carry on the useful functions of the six participating agencies by contributing to the Community Chest as generously as we can afford."

PANTS ON HORSE OWNER'S DODGE TO CONCEAL CRUELTY

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Those who remember unimportant bits of miscellany may recall a remark once made in connection with a courtroom appearance of Miss Sally Rand—that some people are so pure of mind they would put pants on a horse.

It all came back today in a case which concerned purity not at all, but which did involve a horse with pants on.

The horse's owner, Lorenzo Popolo told Magistrate Sylvester Sabbatino: "I like my children. I like my horse. I put pants on my children. I put pants on my horse."

Patrolman Joseph Ryan disrupted the picture of equine sartorial splendor with an assertion that the pants in question concealed the fact that the horse was so poorly shod that his forelegs were sprung and that to drive a horse in such condition was cruelty to the horse.

"It's all right for you to love your children and keep pants on them," the magistrate told Lorenzo, "but if you love your horse, keep pants off him; understand? case dismissed."
