

32-HR. WK. DEMAND BY AUTO UNIONS CLOSES 2 PLANTS

Workers Refuse to Enter Factories, 12,000 Idle—No Disorder.

Detroit, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A United Automobile Workers' demonstration for a 32-hour week closed two large factories here today and left approximately 12,000 men idle.

The main plant of the Plymouth Motor Corp. remained closed this morning when approximately 3,000 employees stood outside the gates and refused to enter, declaring they would not work more than 32 hours weekly.

A short time later the Mack avenue plant of the Briggs Manufacturing Co., which employs 9,000 men making bodies for the Plymouth plant, also closed, awaiting resumption of Plymouth operations.

C. G. Edelen, chief steward of the UAW Plymouth local, said the demonstration was not a strike and the men would return to work Monday morning at the regular hour. He said they did not intend to work more than 32 hours a week, however.

The men, many recently recalled for new model production, have been working 40 hours weekly.

The demonstrators milled around the gates for more than an hour, but at 9:30 all of them had left.

Union President Homer Martin announced this week the 32-hour week would be sought.

In the specific case of Chrysler-Plymouth plants the union claims an agreement with the management on the 32-hour question although the parties have been unable to agree on details.

The Plymouth management said a statement would be forthcoming in the day.

There was no disorder at the plant although police seized a union sound car and detained the driver.

CHANCE SEEN TO END WAGE FIGHT

Portland, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A feeling of "excellent progress" grew out of a meeting yesterday between Doernbecher Furniture company officials and union workers who refused to accept a 10-cent per hour wage cut, Howard D. Chastain, company vice-president, said last night.

Chastain said another meeting would be held soon.

The plant employs about 1,100 men.

Donald W. Smith of Washington, D. C., member of the national labor relations board, discussed lumber-labor policies with the C. I. O. A. F. of L. and industrial leaders.

He said he desired to become "personally familiar" with the situation in the Portland area where a jurisdictional dispute has hampered saw-mills for more than a year. Although plants were operating, the controversy has never been satisfactorily concluded.

ANTI-JEW DECREE, HOLY WAR, WORRY

(By The Associated Press) Difficult minority problems demanded attention today in Europe, its face already today by settlement of the Czechoslovak issue, and in the Holy Land.

In Italy, the Fascist grand council laid down anti-Semitic regulations in a series of orders for "defense of the Italian race."

In Palestine, British military authorities attempted to quell guerrilla fighting between Jews and Arabs, both of whom claim the Holy Land as their national home. An Arab movement against British rule, which flared into violence July 5, has caused 1,700 casualties.

GUFFEY'S LETTER UNDER NEW QUIZ

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The senate campaign expenditures committee ordered further investigation today of the authorship of a fund solicitation letter sent out by the Pennsylvania Democratic state committee over the name of Senator Guffey (D., Pa.).

Chairman Sheppard (D., Tex.) said Guffey had denied all knowledge of the letter. The committee previously declared a violation of the law restricting senators in soliciting political funds would be involved if Guffey had authorized the letter and it had gone to any person receiving federal compensation.

Two investigators who made a progress report to the committee were ordered to return to Pennsylvania for further inquiry. Sheppard said their report would be received at the committee's next meeting in 10 days.

The committee also ordered continued its investigation of charges involving alleged political activity on the part of WPA employees in Tennessee.

IRELAND VOCALLY FOR PLEBESCITE

DUBLIN, Oct. 7.—(AP)—A vocal campaign for a plebiscite in northern Ireland grew louder today on both sides of the frontier between that region, also known as Ulster and hitherto loyal to the British crown, and the Republic of Ireland (Eire).

Nationalist hopes for reunion of Ulster's six counties with the rest of Ireland, whetted by Germany's successful campaign for the Sudeten Germans of Czechoslovakia, were spurred by reports Irish Prime Minister Eamon De Valera had told British Prime Minister Chamberlain he believed the time was opportune for a plebiscite.

De Valera, however, refused to comment on the reports he had raised the question of self-determination for the "Sudeten Irish" in Ulster when he called on Chamberlain in London October 4.

NO KNIFE WIELDED IN STREET FIGHT, OFFICIALS THINK

Last Sunday morning's street brawl in placid Jacksonville headed toward its denouement in justice of the peace court tomorrow morning as the investigating authorities came to the conclusion today that, after all, no knife was wielded during the fracas.

The thorough investigation has led to the belief, authorities said, that instead of being stabbed by a knife Elliott Rhoten, Jacksonville youth, was cut beneath the shoulder blade when he was knocked against a car or the tin shoe sign that adorns the shoe shop before which one furious round of the free-for-all fight was fought.

Two of three Camp Applegate CCC youths brought in for questioning yesterday and one of two held in jail were released. As the case stands now two CCC boys and two Jacksonville youths stand charged with disorderly conduct.

The CCC enrollees, Ford J. Slaton, 19, and Harold R. Garrett, 22, are to be arraigned tomorrow on disorderly conduct charges. The two Jacksonville youths, Gail Lusk, 19, and his brother Calvin, 21, have already pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct and are awaiting sentence. All four are at liberty on their own recognizance.

The fight started, the sheriff's office said, when the Lusk brothers became incensed upon finding that their car had been placed against a fire hydrant while they were at a dance.

Asks Own Arrest PROSSER, Wash., Oct. 7.—(AP)—Arthur Love, 18, arrested at his own request when he told Benton county Sheriff A. M. Richter he was one of four prisoners who escaped from the Polk county, Ore., yesterday. The escape was made September 30.

Similar to Bridges, But—WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Joseph Streeker, whose fight against deportation affects the similar case of Labor Leader Harry Bridges, asked the supreme court today to uphold a lower court ruling that he should not be banished from the country as a communist.

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JAPANESE REACH VITAL RAILROAD

SHANGHAI, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Japanese forces reached a railway route to the military heart of China today and reported a series of gains at far-distant points of the sprawling Chinese battleground.

Chinese admitted Japanese cavalrymen had fought their way to the Peiping-Hankow railway that leads to the nation's military capital, Hankow, culminating a 200-mile, cross-country detour drive that started four months ago.

Japanese advancing up the Yangtze river occupied Kichun, 80 miles down stream from Hankow, and, far to the north, four Japanese columns were converging on the mountain stronghold of the eighth army, elusive legions of Chu Teh, Chinese red Napoleon.

The main Japanese cross-country force, Chinese said, still was a considerable distance from the railway. The cavalry detachment was admitted to have raided Luiling, 92 miles north of Hankow, and Japanese asserted the railway had been severed.

Portland, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Five crew members, all Orientals, from the Philippine steamer Don Jose and the Norwegian motorship Bonville were indicted yesterday by a federal grand jury on charges of importing opium.
