

GOV. MARTIN TO ATTEND SHASTA-CASCADE CONFAB

Five Hundred Expected to Attend Convention at Ashland Opening Monday

Vanguard of the expected five hundred delegates and guests began arriving in Ashland yesterday for the eighth annual convention of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association which embraces three counties in southern Oregon and six in northern California.

Heading the list of expected notable in attendance will be Gov. Charles H. Martin, H. Lloyd Craig of Victoria, B. C., director in charge of the provincial government tourist and industrial bureau, and Charles H. Purcell, personal representative of Gov. Frank P. Merriam of California, chairman of the California highway commission and of the California Golden Gate international exposition commission. The list of participating notables includes more than 50 representatives of various government, state and municipal organizations and agencies having to do with the development and exploitation of scenic, recreational and natural resources and highway projects.

The convention will be under way at 8 a. m. Monday with the breakfast of the board of directors and guests. Morning, luncheon and afternoon group sessions will conduct the business of the convention and evening will be devoted to entertainment, chief of which will be the first public initiatory ceremony ever given by the Crater club.

SUSPENDED TERMS GIVEN BATTLERS

Calvin Luak, 21, and Gail Luak, 19, Jacksonville brothers, were each fined \$10 and \$4.50 costs in justice of the peace court yesterday afternoon on a charge of disorderly conduct to which they had previously pleaded guilty.

The Luak brothers were accused of starting the free-for-all brawl on the Jacksonville streets early last Sunday morning in which Elliott Rhoden, 28, of Jacksonville suffered a deep cut under the right shoulder blade. At first it was thought Rhoden had been stabbed but an investigation satisfied the sheriff's office that he probably was cut when he was knocked against a car or a tin shoe sign. Rhoden himself, still showing signs of the battle, was brought before Judge William R. Coleman on a charge of disorderly conduct and given a suspended sentence for one year.

Two Camp Applegate CCC youths, Ford J. Slaton, 19, and Harold R. Garrett, 22, who admitted taking part in the fight, also received suspended sentences for a year on a disorderly conduct charge. They and Rhoden pleaded guilty.

The battle started when the Luak brothers issued a general invitation to combat after they had emerged from a dance and found their car up against a fire hydrant. It was brought out in court Judge Coleman indicated that his patience has been exhausted with brawls in Jacksonville and the Applegate. Deputy Sheriff William Greenbrier said the sheriff's office has to spend a lot of time policing Jacksonville and the court added that investigation of brawls costs the county a lot of money.

SPRAGUE, HOLMAN TO TALK MONDAY AT G. O. P. MEETING

Mr. Denman urged the public, both men and women of all political parties, to attend both the luncheon and the rally.

INSURANCE CASE JURY DISMISSED

After an all-night session the jury returned to Judge Claude McCulloch in U. S. district court at 9 a. m. yesterday that no agreement could be reached in the case of Albert C. Schultz and William R. Seyre of Klamath Falls against the State Mutual Life Assurance company of Worcester, Mass.

The jury was dismissed. The case concluded the Medford fall term of federal court. The case went to the jury at 3:30 p. m. Friday.

Schultz and Seyre, acting jointly and as trustees, sued to recover \$10,000 on an insurance policy issued by the defendant company to Albin J. Lundell of Klamath Falls.

The three men were partners in the Klamath Molding company which was made beneficiary of the \$10,000 policy. It was brought out that Lundell applied for the policy on May 29, 1937, paid the first premium on August 21 and died on September 15 of the same year.

The company refused payment of the policy on the ground that there was alleged fraud in the application in that Lundell did not correctly disclose his state of health, the defendant alleging that he had heart and kidney ailments.

Wilson S. Wiley of Klamath Falls, associated with G. Q. D'Aibini, was counsel for the plaintiffs. The Portland firm of Wood, Mathieson & Rankin was counsel for the defendant. Robert Rankin conducted the defense with Attorney Charles W. Reames as associate.

HURLED CUCUMBER INJURES AUTOIST

A cucumber, hurled from another automobile through the windshield of the car in which he was a passenger, caused A. A. Boyce, 68, to sustain a severed artery in his arm, the strange mishap occurring Friday morning about four miles north of Medford on the Pacific highway. Mr. Boyce was not seriously injured, the flow of blood being stopped by a Medford physician and his arm bandaged.

Mr. Boyce was riding in a car driven by his son, Benton Boyce. The cucumber, which shattered the windshield of the Boyce car and drove a sliver of glass into Mr. Boyce's wrist, was thrown from a machine just before the two cars passed each other traveling in the opposite direction. Neither the injured man nor his son were able to give police a description or license number of the vehicle from which the cucumber was hurled.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK LAUNCHED

National Fire Prevention week starts today and public attention will be centered throughout the country on the serious task of reducing the huge annual toll taken by fire in life and property.

For Medford a program stressing the prevention of fire has been prepared by Chief Roy Elliott. During the week speakers will give short talks on fire prevention in all the schools through arrangements made by the chief with E. H. Hedrick, school superintendent.

"We always get splendid cooperation in the schools," Chief Elliott said, adding that the message of fire prevention always reaches the home through the alert-minded school children.

An exhibit designed to show the need of fire prevention is being arranged for display at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

PARENT MEETING TO OPEN TUESDAY AT CHRISTIAN CH.

Mothers met 80 years ago "prayerfully to consider" the upbringing of their children. In much the same frame of mind, though they do not describe it in those words, mothers meet today. At a meeting to be held at the First Christian church on South Oakdale avenue, on Tuesday, October 11, parents are invited to attend the first regular parent education meeting of the year, the Family Living Conference, to be held under the auspices of the extension service, with Mabel G. Mask, county home demonstration agent, in charge of arrangements.

The topic for discussion at the meeting will be "How Has Parent Education Changed?" The very topic is an evidence of change and growth, because not so very many years ago it would have read this way, "What Is Parent Education?" or "Why Educate Parents?"

Parent education has become a live and growing movement which is sweeping the country today. Oregon already has 43 active study clubs with 837 members enrolled, organized under the extension service in only four counties. Of these, Jackson county claims 31 with 222 members.

Do you like to reminisce? One experiences a sense of elation when realizes how times have changed and what progress has been made. There is a reason for going back to "parent education" as a subject of importance to be served by contrasting the past and the present. Behind all of the modern theories which have evolved by way of experimentation and research, lies causes which reach far into the past. Problems of parents remain much the same, but practice, approach and method of child care and guidance have changed. Are you interested in knowing why the changes have come?

Under the leadership of Mrs. Maud Morse, extension specialist in parent education, we shall contrast parent education of yesterday, with parent education of today—without scoffing at the past and without holding up the new methods as infallible. It helps to stabilize a fast growing movement to look back over the course which it has followed and to step for contemplation before continuing.

The morning session will open at 10 a. m. with Mrs. Zubia Gates, county project leader in parent education, in charge. The discussion will be of parent education, past and present. The noon luncheon will be served by the county extension committee with the cooperation of home extension units. In the afternoon there will be a discussion of any questions which you care to drop in the question box. Then we shall turn to mapping our course for the future in parent education. The organization of study clubs and the subject matter to be presented this year will be discussed in detail. There will be a nursery school provided for the care of small children. This in itself is an evidence of how times have changed. It is no longer necessary to hold your child on your lap while you try to listen to the speaker.

It is no longer considered a good practice to talk about children in front of children, nor to expect children to remain quiet for an hour or two without anything to keep them occupied. A competent person will be in charge of their care so that mothers and as many fathers as can, may attend and enjoy the meeting.

Presbytery of Southwest Oregon in its closing session accepted the invitation of the Medford Presbyterian church to hold its next stated meeting in the Medford church. This occurs April 11, 1939.

G. W. Wheatley of Klamath Falls was taken under the care of Presbytery with a view toward ordination. It is expected that Rev. Forrest C. Traville, his wife, and three children will sail October 24 for Slurm where he will engage in evangelistic work under the Presbyterian board of foreign missions. He was formerly at Merrill.

A special Fire Point conference committee was appointed to arrange for the young people's conferences for next summer, and if the way is clear for a Presbyterial Retreat and an intermediate conference. The committee consists of Rev. John W. Hoyt, chairman, Rev. J. H. Edgar, Mrs. Baker, Mrs. Roy Martin, James Pinkerton and Lester Newberry.

Rev. Morris H. Roach was received as a member and to be enrolled upon the reception of his Presbyterial letter. He will be stated supply at Roseburg for the next nine months.

NO PARKED CARS FROM 1 TO 5 A. M.
