board and the board's policies. "We are not opposing or antagonizing our great president in presenting this point of view," Green shouted. "We shall cooperate with him and we hold he will cooperate with us."

The resolution committee report on board member Smith urged the A.F.L. "leave no stone unturned or any avenue unexplored for the purpose of preventing senate confirmation of Smith's reappointment."

Under the authority granted by the convention, the federation high command will move immediately to ask every candidate for a senate seat to announce before the general election in November whether he will vote to reject the Smith appointment.

The committee report adopted on revision of the Wagner act, charged the board's administration of the law was (pro-CIO) and its decisions had "promoted strife."

The committee said the board had brought administrative justice "into disrepute" and said amendments should be presented to congress changing the Wagner act.

The committee report recommended the executive council consider further suggested amendments which would create a new tribunal to exercise the purely judicial powers of the Wagner act, leaving the administrative duties in the hands of the existing board.

The convention also adopted a resolution declaring again its belief in the innocence of Thomas J. Mooney, imprisoned in the San Francisco Preparedness day bombing case.

The United States supreme court refused again today to review Mooney's case. Late today the committee is expected to bring in a report on CIO and the question of "dualism and secession," blaming the CIO high command for the failure of past peace negotiations, and renewing charges communists have gotten a foothold in John L. Lewis' rival organization.

There were reports the committee might declare the reputed communist activity in the CIO constituted a bar to reopening of unity conferences.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Asked to comment on an accusation by Dr. H. E. Riggs, president of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the PWA is squandering government funds on the Grand Coulee irrigation project and other building jobs "as useless as the pyramids," Secretary of Interior Ickes said.

"I most certainly do not agree with Mr. Riggs. I don't suppose he knows more than all the engineers who worked and cooperated with us on the Grand Coulee dam."

BAY CITY LABOR PICKETS BATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A dozen AFL warehousemen retired today after their first overt conflict with CIO warehousemen, who turned out 200 pickets to prevent the AFL group from manning a new liquor distributing depot.

The CIO union claimed it had blocked, for the time being at least, an effort of liquor distributors to open an "unfair" warehouse and break the tie-up in liquor distribution caused by the shutdown of CIO plants in a dispute with the CIO union.

Thomas C. White, secretary of the AFL union, said his men were "intimidated by a young army of CIO men," and went home.

"I don't believe the employers will try to open up now," he said. "They are on the point of deciding, if the

city of San Francisco is to be ruled by CIO policy, to take the business to Fresno."

White said the eight liquor wholesalers backing the new depot were not among those closed in the dispute with CIO, but admitted his men were called to the place to unload a car of liquor from a closed house.

Northwest Wheat Up PORTLAND, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Purchases by the federal surplus commodity corporation strengthened the northwest cash wheat market last week and increased the price about half a cent per bushel.

Gets Heating Bid PORTLAND, Oct. 10.—(AP)—L. H. Hoffman of Portland submitted a low bid of \$126,217 today for the construction of a heating plant at the state capitol in Salem.

Reconsider Tillamook Grant WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The public works administration considered restoration of a \$77,750 allotment for enlargement of the coast guard station on Tillamook bay, Ore.

CZECH AND NAZI FRONTIER CLASH

PRAGUE, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Czechoslovak government announced today German troops had penetrated beyond the new Czechoslovak-German frontier in six instances and reported several disorders in connection with German occupation.

Three Czechoslovak state police and several members of the Sudeten German free corps were said to have been wounded in a machine-gun battle on the Elbe river bridge near Ausig. The Czechoslovaks captured a machine-gun and freed a police inspector who had been taken prisoner.

One Czechoslovak soldier was reported injured near Koyne by free corps troopers who kicked and beat him. Several members of a state police

detachment were said to have been wounded in a fight at Mikulov Sunday with German storm troop and elite guard formations.

VATICAN PROTEST ON CLERIC RIOT

ROME, Oct. 10.—(AP)—L'Osservatore Romano, Vatican newspaper, today protested against the "outrageous attack" made by a Viennese crowd Saturday night against the palace of Theodore Cardinal Innitzer, archbishop of Vienna.

A Vatican source indicated a report on "the motive of particulars of the violence" was expected from the papal nuncio at Berlin, Monsignor Cesare Orsenigo.

(Vienna reports said the cardinal suffered a slight wound on the forehead from a piece of flying glass when a window of his private chapel

in which he was praying during the attack, was shattered.)

The Vatican newspaper published a news dispatch from Vienna on the incident, having no official report from church authorities. Vatican circles said this was due to lack of papal representation in Berlin. L'Osservatore Romano said:

"We raise our Christian and civil protest, expressing to the Archbishop of Vienna sentiments of sincere and profound condolence for the outrage caused to his person and in him to the religion and church of Christ."

Valuation Cut SALEM, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Portland Gas & Coke company was valued at \$13,659,519 by the state tax commission today, a \$390,724 decrease from 1937.

Hits Deer, Hurt SANTA MONICA, Cal., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Crashing into a wild deer that ran out on a highway, Mrs. Geraldine Baker, wife of radio singer Kenny Baker, was seriously injured today when her automobile overturned twice.

AUTO UNION FIRM FOR 32-HR. WEEK

DETROIT, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A spokesman for the United Automobile workers at Flint, said today union employees of the General Motors Corp. Chevrolet division these would refuse to work more than 32 hours this week.

The announcement by Harry Mangold, chairman of the Chevrolet division of local 156, UAW, said that "when the last shift has completed its work Thursday night, employees will refuse to return to work until Monday."

He said the decision was made at a meeting Saturday afternoon, attended by about 1800 men.

Meanwhile, 15,000 Detroit employees of the Briggs Manufacturing Co. and the Chrysler Corp. Plymouth division, idle late last week because of their refusal to work more than 32 hours a week, were back on the job.

MANIACS CAUGHT; OPEN GUN PROBE

UKIAH, Calif., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Sheriff E. L. Williams and Mendocino state hospital authorities today hunted for the source of two guns which two escaped criminally insane convicts had when recaptured Saturday night.

One of the two guns, misused in a search by guards, was used yesterday by the pair in a second desperate attempt to escape.

Leo Rodoni, officials reported, pulled a pistol out of his clothing when marched to his cell. He was disarmed, they said, but not until he and Alvin Osten "put up plenty of resistance."

The two escaped Friday night after opening seven doors on their way to freedom with a makeshift passkey. They were captured Saturday night without resistance by two guards less than ten miles away from the institution. They had outfitted themselves in the brief time they were gone with complete changes of clothes, including overcoats, canned food supply and had obtained a shotgun, besides the pistol.

16 DIE IN CRASH OF BELGE PLANE

BERLIN, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Sixteen passengers, all Germans, and a Belgian crew of four were killed today when a Belgian airliner crashed near Soest, in the Ruhr valley in north-western Germany.

An eye witness said the plane lost a wing in midair. It was an Italian-made Savoia, type 883. It was flying through rain and fog which covered western Germany this afternoon.

The passengers were said to have fallen or jumped from the plane before it crashed in flames. The liner was on its regular Brussels-Essen-Berlin run.

Sir Harry Teyford, lord mayor of London and British legion officials had traveled from London to Brussels on the machine, but changed there to another plane bound for Prague. The lord mayor is in charge of a British relief mission for Czechoslovak refugees.
