Speaking before the weekly luncheon-meeting of the Kiwanis club in the Hotel Medford this afternoon, Congressman James W. Mott said he hoped the state highway commission would use some of the federal road grant money in strengthening the Pacific highway between Grants Pass and Roseburg. The congressman, seeking reelection, said the navy department is showing a changed attitude toward defense on the Oregon coast and he envisioned the installation of adequate naval defenses within the next year or two. The congressman was also optimistic over the prospects of building Rogue River valley flood control dams that would give agriculture in the whole valley ample water at all times.
