HEAVIEST BATTLE IN WEEKS RAGES UPON EBRO FRONT

HENDAYE, France. At the Spanish frontier, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The heaviest fighting in weeks in Spain's civil war raged today on the Ebro river front, where government dispatches said a sudden offensive by government militiamen had resulted in capture of the strategic Pandola mountains and threatened Gandesa itself.
The battle began late yesterday, when government troops, who had been holding their lines against a series of insurgent local attacks, launched a carefully planned offensive.
Wave after wave of militiamen, protected by heavy artillery fire, swept across the Santa Madalena river, which was the scene of terrific fighting nearly a month ago when the government halted one of General Franco's attempts to push them back to the Ebro.
Gandesa, important communications center in northeastern Spain, also was the goal of the government's surprise offensive launched July 26, when militiamen swept across the Ebro and drove to within a few miles of the city before being halted. Since then action on the Ebro front has consisted largely of the insurgents' efforts to regain the territory west of the Ebro.

Hearst Station Sold
NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Liquidation of the radio interests of William Randolph Hearst was furthered today with the sale of station WINS, New York, to Milton H. Blow, New York advertising man. Blow said this was the first radio station in which he was a stockholder of record.

STORE TEETH DOG GOES TO REWARD

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Mac, a Boston terrier that received nationwide publicity a year ago when a dentist fitted his toothless jaws with a set of "store teeth," died this week at the ripe old age of 17. Mac was the pet of George Earle, hotel owner.

The dog used the dental plates expertly to the day of his death.

STOCK MART WILL CLOSE TOMORROW

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Financial attention will be directed toward European and Canadian markets tomorrow as principal domestic security and commodity exchanges close for Columbus day. The New York stock exchange, local commodities, Chicago board of trade and other domestic grain centers will observe the holiday.

DEFENDANT COMES TO COURT IN BED

HILLSBORO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Prosecutive jurymen in a circuit court trial yesterday finally located the defendant. He was tucked into a bed at the foot of the jury box. Leroy E. Smith, indicted on a charge of attempting to commit a felony against his brother, Dr. C. T. Smith, was carried from a hospital into the courtroom on a cot. The state accused him of threatening Dr. Smith with harm because of an alleged dispute over settlement of their father's estate.

WINNEMUCCA MEET TO ASK BUILDING TRI-STATE ROAD

WINNEMUCCA, Nev., Oct. 11.—(AP)—When the National Reclamation association convenes for its annual meeting in Reno tomorrow it will be asked to go on record favoring early completion of the Winnemucca to Boise Idaho-Oregon-Nevada road as a first class highway. A meeting of Idaho-Oregon-Nevada business men and public officials concluded here last night after a resolution asking for the reclamation group to take action was passed. "The Idaho-Oregon-Nevada road," U. S. Sen. James Pope of Idaho told the delegates, "must be completed at an early date. It will benefit several western states and will be of help in the repayment of government obligations on the Owyhee and other reclamation projects in which the federal government has large investments of from seventy-five to a hundred million dollars. Completion of this road is now probably the most urgent matter in these western states."

"When this is done a long time dream of a north and south highway to the Mexican line will be realized. It means opening up of natural resources of these states and a permanent way to relieve unemployment."

BRITISH LEFTIST BARRED FROM U.S.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(AP)—John Strachey, British leftist, today was ordered excluded from the United States. The order, issued by a special board of inquiry of the immigration authorities at Ellis Island, classed the lecturer and author as "a non-immigrant not in possession of a properly vised passport."

Strachey arrived yesterday on the liner Normandie and promptly was taken into custody by immigration officials. The officials had been notified by the state department the former British parliament member's visa had been cancelled a few hours before the Normandie sailed. Strachey spent last night board the Normandie. Today he was taken to Ellis Island for the board hearing. Then he was given a sitting room, bedroom and bath to occupy until he is deported or wins an appeal to the secretary of labor, the only recourse now open to him.
