Force Reduced — Lookouts and firemen on the Rogue River national forest were reduced in number to 11 today as hazards decreased in most sections of the timber lands. The force had been reduced to nine but was increased on 17 last week-end as east winds dried out the ground cover. Fire conditions remain dangerous in the Applegate district of the forest, headquarters said.

New Anthology — Available today was a new anthology of children's literature, prepared by Miss Ollie Depew, assistant professor of English at the Southern Oregon State Normal school in Ashland, and published by Glinn & company. The anthology is intended for use in normal and elementary grade schools. It is titled "Children's Literature by Grades and Types." It contains material for reading in the first eight grades, arranged by grades and types and giving the student a vocabulary and comprehension. The book also provides guidance in selecting other reading material for each grade. Miss Depew, considered an authority on children's literature, devoted much time and research to the production of the anthology.
