## MILLING THROG OF WOMEN BATTLE FOR CHORE JOBS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12—(AP)—A milling throng of women—civil service commission officials said there were 25,000—formed a Washington police station today in an effort to qualify for jobs as charwomen in federal buildings here. Two thousand application blanks

were to be given out, but officials, who said they feared a riot, stopped the distribution at 1500. Police lines were broken in disorder.

The crowd—a mass of negroes with a sprinkling of white women—began forming last night. Police estimated 3000 were in line at 3 a. m. EST—all wanting to get the 800-a-month job. Many brought blankets, pillows and chairs.

After police restored order, W. O. Hull of the civil service commission, announced to the crowd no more blanks would be given out. Surrounded by officers, he and other commission officials made their way to a patrol wagon which took them through the crowd.

Hull said there was no assurance the women who obtained blanks would get jobs. They would have to pass a physical examination even to be placed on an eligible list—a list which would last for a year or two before all on it found work.
