The weevil usually confines its operations to hairy vetch among the commercial varieties produced here for seed. A selection from common vetch, recently christened Willamette vetch, has displayed winter hardiness and has not been attacked by the weevil.

HIGH WIND FANS FOREST FIRES ON CANADIAN BORDER

Forestry officials watched anxiously today for "critical" developments as forest fires, fanned into new life by strong winds, ate through peat, brush and timber along both sides of the Minnesota-Ontario border.

In their wake the flames left 20 persons dead, many badly injured, and uncounted thousands of dollars worth of damage to homes, farm lands and hay and timber crops.

After receiving reports from state forestry officials lives of some residents in the northern Minnesota border area are "seriously endangered," Gov. Elmer A. Benson gave Adm. Gen. E. A. Walsh broad powers to mobilize national guardsmen to "evacuate citizens of the stricken areas and otherwise cooperate with the forestry department."

The most devastating fires on the Canadian side of the border were reported from Dance township, west of Port Frances, Ont. It was in that section 17 settlers were burned to death.

As thousands of fire fighters, who have worked virtually without rest since Monday, swung axes and shovels in the path of the flames, national guard airplanes circled overhead to spot new outbreaks. The entire area is tinder-dry, and tangles of underbrush and fallen trees hampered the workers.
