

# WHEELER UNITES WITH LABOR UPON RAIL WAGE SLASH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Chairman Wheeler (D., Mont.) of the senate interstate commerce committee advocated today centralization of government control of all forms of transportation, including railroads, trucks and water carriers.

The Montana senator, here to testify for the rail brotherhoods before the president's fact-finding board, said he believed there was "no justification" for the railroads' attempt to force through a 15 percent pay cut. The brotherhoods have voted to strike rather than accept the pay cut.

Wheeler in suggesting all transportation operate under the same controls, was in agreement with George Harrison, rail labor spokesman.

Harrison made that one of his points in a suggested long range program, under which labor, management and the federal government would team up to rehabilitate the carriers. He pleaded with management to withdraw its pay cut demand, for the benefit of all three.

"I think something ought to be done at the next session of congress," Wheeler declared, "about establishing a centralized control of transportation."

"The railroads complain trucks and

water carriers are not regulated and the government is subsidizing the other forms of transportation. The only way this thing can be worked out is to put all transportation under one board."

Asserting his belief a wage cut would be of little benefit to the railroads in the long run, Wheeler declared:

"What the railroads need is more business."

"When a depression comes, the railroads always make the mistake of cutting wages and asking for rate increases. Where would the auto industry be if it tried to raise the prices of its product in a depression?"

# IRRIGATION FUND FOR IDAHO, YAKIMA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The public works administration gave \$750,000 to the reclamation bureau today for use on two western irrigation projects.

PWA said \$400,000 would go to the Sunnyside division of the Yakima project in Washington for betterment and supplemental construction and \$350,000 to the upper Snake river project in Idaho to meet increased costs of materials and supplies.

Two conditions were attached to the Sunnyside allotment at the request of the bureau.

The first, officials said, called for the signing by each district in the division of a separate contract whereby the money would be repaid to the government in 20 annual installments.

The second provided none of the funds could be spent until agreement was reached that suits in federal court here over water rights would be kept inactive until April 1, 1940. Reclamation officials explained this condition was inserted in the hope a satisfactory settlement could be negotiated meanwhile.

# TELESCOPE SHOWS JUPITER HIT BY TERRIFIC STORM

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Storm clouds, black as soot and some 2,000 miles wide, were observed on the planet Jupiter last night by Lyle Abbott, astronomer in charge of the 12-inch telescope of Griffith observatory here.

"So startling was the great black spot," Abbott reports, "that for a time those who were called in to check it were incredulous and believed it was the shadow of one of Jupiter's 11 moons, moon No. 4, which at that time was passing between the earth and Jupiter."

"A check showed immediately, however, there could be no shadow, and we settled down to the exciting task of watching this monstrous phenomenon swiftly passing over the face of the planet. Jupiter rotates on its axis so fast its day and night pass in 9 hours and 55 minutes."

"The huge ebony cloud lay about 10 degrees south of the equator and appeared to be associated with one of the cloud belts. Near it were two pearly oval-shaped areas, surrounded by the normal colored dark belt material."

Abbott said that in three years study of Jupiter nothing so densely black as this has been seen. He said speculation as to the nature of the black cloud ranged from the possibility of a most unusual storm to a vast curtain of lacy black dust shot high into Jupiter's upper atmosphere by a gargantuan volcano.

The planet is 402,541,200 miles farther from the sun today than the earth.

# HUMAN BONES IN ATTIC AT SALEM

SALEM, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A human skull and two thigh bones, found yesterday by Frank McDowell in the attic of his home here, were being investigated today by coroner L. E. Barrick.

Fragments of an old newspaper and gunnysack, much chewed by rodents, were wrapped about the bones, and the newspaper was dated March 8, 1922. The house is owned by McDowell's mother, Mrs. Jessie Rich, who acquired the property only about four years ago.

Authorities suspect they were in the possession of some medical student. Willamette university, however, had discontinued its medical college prior to 1922.

# MARCHING ORDER ISSUED BY POLES IN TESCHEN AREA

TESCHEN, Poland, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Orders were posted throughout the Teschen district today for all Czechs who have settled since November, 1918, in this area, newly acquired by Poland from Czechoslovakia, to leave by November 1.

Most of those affected by the orders are government employes, school teachers, engineers and factory supervisors.

(Havas, French news agency, in a dispatch from Maschrich Ostrau said Czech teachers already had been forcibly ejected from their schools and from the Reschen district.)

Polish authorities are trying to facilitate the enforced exodus by issuing special departure permits to those falling under the orders.

It was understood Czechs who settled in the district after November, 1918—that is, after formation of the Czechoslovak republic—but who cannot or will not leave will be denied Polish passports and will be regarded as undesirable aliens.

(The Teschen area, some 800 square miles with a population of more than 300,000 mostly Polish, was ceded to Poland by the British government on October 1, Occupation began October 2.)

# CAPITOL PIONEER TO GET GOLD LEAF COAT

SALEM—(UP)—Although the bronze statue of a pioneer which now surmounts the new state capitol building is 22 feet high and measures more than five feet around the thigh, it will take only a few dollars worth of gold leaf to cover it completely.

The leaf, pounded so thin it can almost be seen through, will be to protect the statue against erosion. Allan Toole, clerk of the works on the capitol building, said that the gold is pounded so thin that a 20-dollar gold piece could probably cover the whole statue."

JERUSALEM, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The Jaffa plant of the British-American Tobacco company was destroyed today by a fire believed to have been of incendiary origin. The plant had been idle since 1936.

Crashes Espee Train

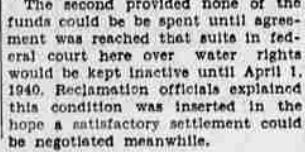
WOODBURN, Oct. 13.—(AP)—An automobile-train collision yesterday

# NORTHWEST FRUIT LOADINGS HIGHER

SEATTLE, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Carloadings of fruit in the Pacific northwest in September totaled 6,404, an increase of 310 over the same month last year, the Pacific northwest advisory board reported today, but all other loadings were lower than last year. The total month's loadings were 92,059, compared with 103,922 last year, the best September in five years.

Loadings to September 30 this year were 661,118. The eight-month total last year was 798,519.

# CZECHS PROTEST NAZI OCCUPATION

PRAGUE, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Czechoslovakia today complained to the international commission settling details of the new Czechoslovak-German boundary. German troops had occupied a number of towns and villages on the Czechoslovak side of the agreed frontier.

One instance cited in the complaint, which was sent to the commission's Berlin headquarters, was the occupation by German troops of several villages near Pilsen.

The propaganda ministry said the differences would be arbitrated by military staffs of the two countries and the Berlin commission.

Germans were said to have agreed to withdraw from the city of Policka, leaving Czechoslovakia in at least temporary possession. Prague census figures showed the city to be almost entirely Czech.

Strengthening of relations between Czechoslovakia and Germany, meanwhile, was foreseen in political circles as a result of the visit of Foreign Minister Frantisek Chvalovskiy to Berlin.

# British Steamer Hit By Barcelona Bomb

BARCELONA, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The British steamer Stanrott was damaged by a bomb today when five insurgent planes raided Barcelona. No casualties on board were reported.

(The Stanrott, 1,407 tons, left Montreal for Barcelona September 21. It was understood she carried Canadian wheat.)

The raiders bombed the city from a great height. The famous statue of Columbus with a hand pointing across the sea, narrowly escaped damage when a bomb fell six yards from its base.

Estimates of casualties in the city were not immediately available.
