A. P. Expert Also Predicts Saturday Games in East and Mid-West.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Operations from short punt formation ready to run, pass or kick (especially run), this football corner takes a look at the week's football slate, leaves a sigh of wistful resignation and emerges with the following guesses:

California-UCLA: That was a minor miracle U. C. L. A. engineered last week against Washington but California power would seem to be the decisive factor here. California.

Stanford-Oregon: The Webfoots may not like it farther south but will be picked on the records. Oregon.

Washington-Oregon State: Washington.

Southern California - Washington State: Just a train-ride for State. Southern California.

Alabama-Tennessee: The game of games in the Southeastern conference this week. It might even settle the championship although that's taking an extremely far-sighted bird's-eye view of the situation. Tennessee, after bowling over Clemson, hurred Auburn, but this is an Alabama horse of another color. Alabama.

Harvard-Army: And still no hope for Harvard.

New York University-North Carolina: One of the toughest of them all to figure, North Carolina, narrowly.

Princeton-Penn: Princeton looks too green to cope with Penn.

West Virginia-Michigan State: West Virginia's been a big disappointment and the ballot goes to Michigan State.

Yale-Navy: Looks like third straight beating for Yale.

Pickem Selects Oregon, Eureka and Wisconsin

Heavy firing occurs on the football front this week-end, what with all Pacific Coast conference clubs swinging into action and numerous eastern and middle-western teams clashing in "gigantic" battles. Billy Hulen is ready for "em. In fact, the mighty prognosticator is more than ready, having tolled for 107 o n s e c u t i v e sleepless hours over his dope sheet and gazing into the crystal ball. If this week's dozen doesn't pay off in plenty of marbles, well—maybe that's just what you should use to wager with marbles.

The following list contains 12 pretty tough battles, in keeping with Mr. Pickem's custom to fool with nothing but the hard-to-pick variety. As usual, Pickem tosses in a startling upset. (Someday, Mr. Pickem is going to hit one of those form reversals. When he does, clear the tracks.) Hold your breath and hang on tight, because here they are:

Medford-Eureka. Sniffle, sniffle and boo-boo, but what can you do about it? Four of Medford's backs are laid up, leaving only five ball carriers to carry on. And, Eureka is tough, it always is. Pickem busted seven crystal balls trying to see a Tornado win tonight in Eureka, but it just wasn't there to see. Broken-heartedly and with a fervent prayer the globe was wrong. He Eureka 13, Medford 9.

Klamath Falls-Ashland. The Grizzlies can't stop those mad, touch-down-crazy Pelicans, but they might keep the score fairly low. It looks like a Klamath win by two touchdowns to none.

Oregon-Stanford. The hankroll on Oregon's Webfoots in this one, but don't ask for points or odds. This corner prefers to call out the coin and it reads—Minnesota.

California-UCLA. The Bruins will give the Golden Bears an interesting afternoon, but that's about all. California power and Vic Bottari in a 14 to 7 conquest over their little cousin from Los Angeles.

Idaho-Gonzaga. Teams like Gonzaga aren't knocking over teams like Idaho this season, my friends. In fact, it is just tough for lots of teams that the Vandals won't in the coast conference. Idaho 20, Gonzaga 0.

Cornell-Syracuse. Two undefeated teams today, Cornell still undefeated after tomorrow. But only after a hard struggle. Ossie Solem has done great coaching at Syracuse, but his team can't stop the big Red machine. Cornell by two touchdowns.

JUNIORS, SPARKED BY WRAY, DEFEAT ASHLAND, 19 TO 0

Cato Wray, a speedy, shifty-hipped left halfback, planted his flying cleats in scoring territory three times at the stadium last night to give Coach George Harrington's Medford junior high grid cracker a 19 to 0 victory over the Ashland Juniors of Coach Earl Rogers. It was the first meeting of the two traditional rivals this season, and nearly 1,000 spectators turned out for the clash.

Wray, operating behind a fast-charging line and getting great blocking from his other backfield mates, called touchdowns in the first, second and fourth quarters. His first payoff burst was a 23-yard fall around Ashland's left end, after the yellow-clad Medfords had put together four consecutive first downs in a 75-yard drive which featured Bill Wall's power smashes and Wray's off-tackle blasts.

He scored again in the second quarter, bowling off Ashland's left tackle and cutting back to take 19 yards into the end zone, and his final touchdown came near the end of the game when he reversed over left tackle for six yards out. This latter Medford drive started 40 yards away. Curt Hopkins added the extra point after the second touchdown with a dropkick.

Medford threatened to score any other touchdown a few seconds before the first half ended, but was held for downs on the one-yard line. Here occurred one of the highlights of the game, a thundering 72-yard punt by Ashland's Martin Herrin, standing 10 yards behind his own goal line, Herrin booted a tremendous spiral that landed squarely on the 50-yard line and rolled 32 yards and into the Medford 10, where Wray picked it up and returned it 10 yards. From the line of scrimmage to the point where the ball was finally downed totaled 72 yards, but actually Herrin's boot traveled 90 yards in the air, and counting the roll, traveled 92 yards from the point where it was kicked. It was one of the greatest kicks ever seen in Medford.

Medford outplayed Ashland in every respect with the exception of the kicking department, rolling up 14 first downs, 11 from scrimmage and three from passes to four for Ashland, 11 from scrimmage and the locals piled up a total of 251 yards to 73 for Ashland, with 203 of Medford's yards coming from running and 46 from passes, while the losers gained 39 yards from rushing and 35 from passes. Medford completed five out of nine attempted passes, while Ashland hit two out of seven.

WEBFOOTS DEPART FOR SOUTH, EAST

EUGENE, Oct. 14.—(AP)—When the Webfoots left for Palo Alto yesterday to meet Stanford tomorrow, they began a journey of thousands of miles to games every Saturday until the end of the season.

The team will entrain for New York after the Stanford battle. It will return to Portland in time to engage Southern California in the highest scoring gridders in the nation tomorrow and then meet Idaho, California, Washington and Oregon State college on successive week-ends.

DUCK SEASON TO START TOMORROW, END NOVEMBER 28

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—A bumper crop of hopeful hunters will open the Oregon duck and goose hunting season at dawn tomorrow.

State game commission and federal biological survey authorities reported southward migrations and observations in the northern nesting grounds revealed the largest number of waterfowl in several years. Heavy wedges of geese have been sighted from Sauvie Island in the Columbia River.

Scores of birds have been spotted on Klamath county waters, one of the most important hunting sections in the state.

Slightly relaxed regulations drew hundreds of sportsmen to marshes for the opening day. The extended season will continue until November 28. Ten ducks may be taken in the state's bag and the possession limit has been boosted from 10 to 20.

Canvassacks are on the legal list, providing not more than three are taken in the aggregate kill. Other birds in this classification include the redhead, bufflehead and ruddy.

The biological survey established the goose limit at five in one day or ten in possession as a 10-day limit. The bag and possession limits for coot are 25. Fifteen jackknipe may be taken, but hunters cannot have more than 15 in possession.
