CUPID WAITS ON LAW AND G-MEN

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14. — (AP) — Cupid waited uncertainly in the Multnomah county jail today after Raymond Dale Kramer, 34, waived extradition at a hearing before U. S. Commissioner Kenneth Frazier for his removal to West Virginia on a murder indictment. Kramer, who had been working in Eugene as a paper hanger under an assumed name, said he and his Eugene fiancée would decide whether they would marry after he appeared before a federal judge late today. The prisoner, accused of participating in a holdup which resulted in the shooting of James Gillis at Terra Alta, W. Va., in 1934, planned to wed last Saturday and had even purchased a ring. The arrest by FBI agents, however, interrupted the romance. The Eugene girl visited him at the jail today. Raymond Teets, said to have been Kramer's companion, received a life sentence.

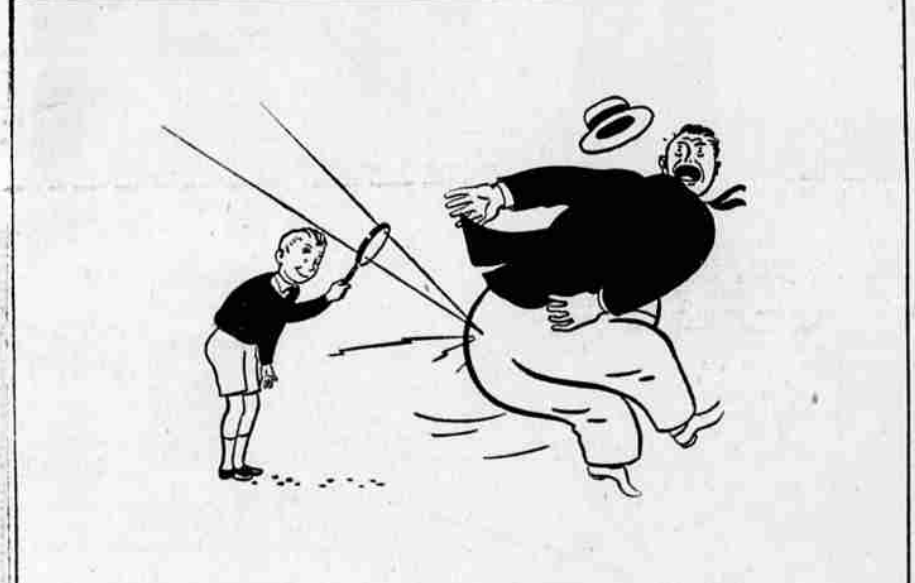
