

BULGARIA MOVES UPON AGITATORS; NIP REVOLUTION

SOPIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 14.—(P)—Scores of persons described as "hostile to the present government" were shipped to jails in the provinces today as a part of nation-wide police precautions taken after discovery of a revolutionary plot.

Hundreds of others were arrested and questioned, and a government spokesman predicted that police would "clear up the entire plot within 24 hours."

Three members of parliament, who three months ago refused to attend a reception given by King Boris, were in custody.

Many Macedonians were arrested and large stores of arms were seized. Precautionary measures were directed mainly against the outlawed Irmo, organization of Macedonian extremists demanding an autonomous state including the 2,000,000 Macedonians now living in Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Greece.

Officials believed the assassination Monday of Maj. Gen. Jordan Peyfif, chief of the Bulgarian army general staff was to have been the signal for revolution.

The assassin, Stoll Kiroff, shot himself.

But before he died, one informant said, he confessed he used pistols supplied by the Irmo and he had been instructed to shoot the king, the premier or some one at the war ministry.

Quick action by King Boris, government quarters said, checked the conspiracy.

Troops and police effected a blockade about Sofia yesterday, suspending traffic and ordering all to remain at home all day. Telephone communication abroad was stopped for 16 hours during the police roundup.

Among those arrested were Colonel Tancheff, former Bulgarian military attaché in Paris, and Major Nekarksky, along with a group of officers similarly taken into custody two years ago on suspicion of plotting against the king.

PRESIDENT EYES NATION DEFENSE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—(P)—President Roosevelt said today he was making an entirely new study of the nation's national defense needs and until it was completed he could not estimate next year's budget.

The president told a press conference he could not comment on the new budget because new technical developments in national defense measures required a complete restudy of defensive requirements.

Asked about yesterday's statement by Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the World War Industries Board, that America was unprepared for war because of lack of sufficient first class equipment, the president said he had not read the statement. He added, however, a good many people were checking the situation in connection with new elements that have come into the defense picture in the last three or four years.

HESS COMES OUT FOR MORE PLANTS

ESTACADA, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Henry L. Hess, Democratic candidate for governor, said yesterday in a campaign speech that Oregon must have better manufacturing facilities for finished products to be produced here from native raw materials.

"Increased industrial activity will mean more jobs for honest workers," Hess said. "I propose to stimulate this activity by direct and effective sales promotional efforts."

Jacksonville Library Busy In September

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 14.—(Sp.)—A total of 757 books were loaned by the Jacksonville library during September, with adult non-fiction proving the most popular with readers, with 306 books, according to Margaret Johnson, librarian. Adult fiction was next with 265 books loaned.

Books of children's fiction loaned totaled 120, while children's non-fiction books totaled 66.

Schooner Race Off

ABOARD THE SCHOONER GERTRUDE L. THEBAUD, GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 14.—(P)—The third race between the schooners Bluenose and Gertrude L. Thebaud, in a three-out-of-five series for the championship of the North Atlantic, was postponed today because of rain, poor visibility and lack of wind.

WARM WEATHER IN EAST SLOWS DOWN RETAIL BUSINESS

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Colombus day promotions swelled the past week's retail trade to a volume exceeding that of the previous week, said Dun & Bradstreet today in their weekly business survey.

Again, however, there was an unfavorable spread as compared with the similar period last year, and unseasonably warm weather was held partly to blame.

"For the country as a whole," asserted the review, "the decrease in volume was estimated at 2 to 10 per cent."

"While the increase in retail sales during the week was most pronounced in the homeware divisions, other departments also benefited from larger consumer expenditures. Children's wear and dress accessories made conspicuous gains."

"Most stores reported total shoe sales somewhat under the September level, but staple styles continued active. Grocery volume was about equal to the previous week when it averaged approximately 10 per cent under last year."

"The pace of wholesale trading quickened noticeably during the week. Retailers noting sales losses attributable directly to thin stocks attempted to get rush shipments on popular merchandise only to find that in many instances mills could promise no better than 2 to 3 weeks delivery."

MULTNOMAH WOE TO LEGISLATURE

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Frank L. Shull, chairman of the Multnomah county relief commission, declared yesterday the 1939 legislature would have to act to solve the county's relief crisis.

At a budget hearing, Shull and others declared that 44 per cent of the tax dollar for 1939 must go for relief, a total of \$1,918,102. This sum, however, exceeds the \$1,288,198 which the six per cent limitation law permits the county to budget.

Therefore, he said, a \$629,908 deficit would have to be raised by the only method permitted the county—a special tax levy.
