

DESERTER ENTERS GUILTY PLEA IN NAZI SPY TRIAL

accused of having acted as a messenger for the so-called spy ring; Otto Herman Voss, 36, a naturalized German formerly employed at the Severn airplane plant at Farmingdale, Long Island, where American army planes are under construction; and Eric Glaser, 28, another naturalized German who was attached to the United States army as a private at the Mitchell field aviation field.

Voss is accused of stealing plans for a high-speed pursuit plane; Glaser of stealing aviation secrets.

If convicted they face a maximum penalty of 20 years imprisonment each.

The four were indicted here last June 20 along with 14 others, including three German war ministry officials who were abroad at the time the case broke, and others who fled this country after testifying before the grand jury.

Chief among those who fled was Dr. Ignatz T. Griehl, a Park Avenue physician. Dr. Griehl, former lieutenant in the United States army medical reserve and head of the Nazi "friends of the new Germany" in this country.

He escaped aboard the German liner Bremen, without his passport and as a "stowaway."

Military authorities at first expressed doubt as to whether the stolen plans, both at the Severn plant and at Mitchell field, had been tampered with, have lent new importance to the case.

LABOR SESSIONS END; WANT PEACE GREEN DECLARES

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 14.—(AP)—American Federation of Labor unions, armed for war but apparently anxious for peace in labor's internal strife, today turned over to their executive council for action the policy mandates of the 58th annual convention which adjourned last night.

Jammed into the program in an 11 day meeting that was dull and stormy by turns were a dozen controversial issues that called for action on the political and industrial fronts. The convention voted to meet in San Francisco in 1939.

After the tumult and debating over questions and the New Deal in the closing days of the session, the convention closed on a "high note of peace." It was sounded by William Green in a speech accepting for the fifteenth time the presidency of the AFL.

"I promise to you," Green said, "that I shall make every contribution that lies within my power toward the promotion of peace in the labor movement; I shall do what I can to heal the wounds and close the breach, and unite the forces of labor."

His avowal to seek unity with the CIO followed convention action approving the continuation of the "war chest" special assessment levied a year ago for extensive organizing purposes and the adoption of a report on "secession and dualism" recommending the council be authorized to "carry on the battle and at the same time stand ready to respond to any genuine appeal for peace."

Daniel J. Tobin, leader of 350,000 members of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, and the lone outstanding advocate of immediate peace action by the leadership, said it might take a month or a year to reopen the unity negotiations with the CIO broken off last December after a tentative formula for peace had been reached.

SWASTIKA CARVED ON JEWISH YOUTH

BIRMINGHAM, N. J., Oct. 14.—(AP)—A nine-year-old Jewish boy bore on his forehead a crudely shaped double swastika, carved into the flesh with a penknife by two older youths who, in the words of a police judge, "emulated in a land of liberty the hatreds of an old world."

Judge Thomas J. Holleran told the Jewish lad and his tormentors, a 14-year-old boy of German descent and a 17-year-old youth of Italian descent, the American flag "was a symbol of liberty and decency while the swastika was symbolic of bestiality and bullying."

The father of the Jewish boy, a federal employe attached to the internal revenue department, told the court his son came home crying Tuesday to tell how two boys seized and branded him as he was walking through a park near his home.

No charges were filed against the older boys.
