NEW DEAL PLANS NEW ATTACK UPON JOBLESS PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14. (AP)—Informed persons in the administration disclosed today a broad new attack on the problem of unemployment is in the making.

This may result, they said, in presentation to congress early next year of a correlated program for restoring work opportunities by improving conditions in the nation's basic durable goods industries. Details have not been made known.

At the same time it was learned a major objective of the monopoly investigating committee will be to uncover business practices and faults in the nation's economic structure which, in the words of one member, "cause conditions in which people can't get jobs."

The committee's work probably will be concerned with a long range solution to the problem, but some administration officials are more interested in starting on a program during the winter.

These officials contend no substantial improvement in business can be expected until the nation's estimated 10,000,000 or more jobless begin returning to useful employment in private industry.

They say a sound prosperity must be based on restoring prosperous conditions to the heavy goods industry. This can be brought about, they argue, by setting the railroads on their feet so they again can become big customers, by further stimulating building construction, by encouraging greater automobile production, and in similar ways.

It is their contention that the pick-up in 1937 resulted almost entirely from improvements in so-called consumer goods markets, and it collapsed because those improvements were not supported by advances in the durable goods industries.

Aubrey Williams, deputy WPA administrator, said yesterday after a White House call:

"Employment is increasing everywhere, and the outlook is brighter than at any time in a year. I look for a steady increase in employment all over the United States."

BRITE BROTHERS NOW FACE NOOSE

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 14. (P)—Governor Frank P. Merriam announced he had received from the advisory board a recommendation that the request of John and Coke Brite convicted Blakely county slayers for commutation of sentence from death to life imprisonment be denied.

They are in Folsom prison under sentence to hang for the killing of two police officers and a civilian during a fight at Horse creek in August 1936.

The state supreme court had recommended the death sentence be commuted to life imprisonment. Governor Merriam referred the case to the pardon board. The board had previously recommended against clemency.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 14. (P)—H. A. Canaday, Roseburg attorney, last night was selected by the Douglas county Republican central committee as the party nominee for the office of state legislator. He succeeds Bernard A. Young who recently resigned because of a change in residence to Portland.

Mr. Canaday, who came to Oregon from Illinois in 1910 and engaged in the practice of law at Medford, moved to Roseburg in 1924 when he was appointed registrar at the U. S. land office here. He served 11 years in that position and then engaged in the practice of law in Roseburg.

The central committee took four ballots in selecting the candidate from among five nominated. Those eliminated were Wallace Rapp, Roseburg merchant; George Bacon, Looklogless orchardist; Thomas Hartfel and Paul Geddes, Roseburg attorneys.
