Table Rock

TABLE ROCK, Oct. 13.—(Sp.)—The filling of silos has been finished here for the season, the last cutting of alfalfa put up and the onion harvest is in full swing. Fewer silos were filled this year, owing to a shortage of corn. The alfalfa tonnage was much lighter than previous years, but both the acreage and yield of onions will show an increase. Pear picking is being rapidly brought to a close and as there are no apples in the district to pick this will end the fruit harvest for the year.

Several plots of fall lettuce were seeded by local farmers and at this writing is looking quite promising.

Some twenty acres of sugar beets for seed purposes were sown here last month and the little plants are now being cultivated and seeded.

No trespassing signs are being posted by farmers here in anticipation of the hunting season soon to open.

Many inquiries for hay are being received by local farmers from stock men in other parts of the county.

Fall seeding of grain is going ahead on several farms here and quite a little vetch is being seeded for hay and cover crops.

Frances Russel has recently purchased a new tractor of more horse power than the one he previously had.

The political pot surely isn't boiling in these parts, not even simmering. No candidates showing themselves, no arguments and everything quieter than usual.

Corn husking is just getting under way here. A good frost would make the snapping easier and would color the autumn leaves.
