

# Oregon State Scores 13-6 Upset Win Over Faltering Washington

## HAPLESS HUSKIES MAKE 5 FUMBLES, BEAVERS OUTPLAY

### O. S. C. Now Title Contender—Break Tie With Air And Power Thrusts.

SEATTLE, Oct. 15.—(AP)—That toothless old Washington Husky, apparently roaming the gridiron without a license this season, was cut off and kicked around again today, this time by surprising Oregon State college team, 13 to 6.

Twenty thousand fans who turned out to see for themselves what was holding the Huskies back, were dumfounded and bewildered watching Coach Jimmy Phelan's fumbling footballers make three losses and a tie in four starts after being hailed as potential champs of the Pacific coast conference.

As a consequence, Oregon State college, the underdog of the game, moved into title consideration and Washington slipped definitely out of contention.

Five fumbles, one that led to Oregon State's first touchdown, put the Huskies under the hammer and kept them from making any sustained headway, except when they maneuvered their only score on five plays at the outset of the second half.

Oregon State forged into the lead in the first period, Washington led the count at 6-0 in the third, and the Beavers marched to triumph with a 65-yard push in the same quarter with bombardments from the air.

Get Break

The most important break of the battle came late in the first period when Dan McAdams, trying to make a shoe-string catch of a punt, muffed the ball and Joe Wendlick, O.S.C. end, recovered on the Washington 32-yard line.

Washington dug in desperately and held off the first Beaver blast, but after an exchange of punts, O.S.C. got a second chance from the Husky 30 and charged pill-meal to the goal line. Big Jim Kieselburgh and Morris Kohler punched out two first downs to the Washington two yard line, and Harold Higgins, substitute halfback, ploughed to the touchdown.

Presett Hutchins' place kick for the extra point was wild.

At the start of the third period the hapless Husky suddenly turned mad and in four offensive plays, romped on an easy touchdown, starting from the Washington 40. Al Frank whipped a 20-yard pass to Frank Peters, who in turn whisked a lateral to Jimmy Johnston, and the big halfback ran off 23 more to reach the O.S.C. 17. Two plunges gained four more and Cruser then swung wide, took a perfect lateral from Johnston, and dashed for the goal line unopposed. His try at the extra point fizzled badly.

Passes and Power

The fans had hardly finished their first exciting cheer of the contest before the Oregon Staters came charging back. Taking possession of the ball on their own 35, the Beavers rolled up three quick first downs. Kieselburgh passed to Morris Kohler for 27; Morris shot an aerial to Mercer; Kieselburgh romped to the Washington 19, and then sent an air-rocket to Holly Holcomb for 16 yards to reach the Washington 3.

On his second drive over the struggling line, Kieselburgh planted the winning touchdown over the goal stripes. Crossing up the Huskies on the play for the extra point, Vic Kohler slipped a short pass to Joe Wendlick.

Out of Luck

Lack of time kept Oregon State from making a serious attempt for another touchdown at the end of the second period. Emile Schultz recovered a fumbled punt by Washington's Jimmy Johnston on the Husky 19, and a pass from Bob Olson to Holcomb carried the Beavers to the nine yard line but the gun halted the thrust.

Washington was within scoring regions twice in the last period, shooting passes from the O.S.C. 32 and 20, only to have both intercepted by wide-awake Beavers. Vic Kohler spiked the first aerial attack by hauling down the pigskin on his 4-yard line, and Hutchins snared the other.

For Both Oregon State's touchdowns, Coach Lon Stinner rushed Quarterback Holly Holcomb into the fray to direct offensive activities and he called the right plays.

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## TENNESSEE POWER UPSETS ALABAMA, HOLY CROSS BEAT

### Strong Teams Defeated In Saturday's Play—Purdue Ties Fordham—Many Surprises.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The roof fell in on football's mighty today, taking a heavy toll of the nation's undefeated but leaving unscathed such major powers as Pitt, Texas Christian, Minnesota, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Duke.

The east, south, midwest and far west all contributed to the casualty list as Holy Cross, Penn. Navy, New York University, Brown, Columbia, Cornell, Michigan, Wisconsin, Alabama, Mississippi and Oregon all fell by the wayside.

Alabama's defeat was perhaps the biggest surprise of the day.

The Tide, easy conqueror of Southern California in its first test, fell victim to Tennessee power and the individual brilliance of George Cato and the Volunteers won, 13-0.

Cornell, hailed as one of the east's greatest arrays, yielded to Syracuse, 19-17, the winners scoring all their points in the final quarter.

Holy Cross, unbeaten since 1936, was nipped by undefeated Carnegie Tech, 7-6; Penn was surprisingly upset by an alert Princeton team, 13-0; Navy was stopped by Yale, 9-17 as Gil Humphrey passed for a touchdown and then kicked a game-winning field goal; Columbia, with Strickman stopped cold, was trounced by Colgate, 12-0; New York University yielded to North Carolina, 7-0; while Brown after fighting strenuously for the first half, bowed to undefeated Dartmouth, 34-13.

In the mid-west, Michigan's potent Wolverines out-gained Minnesota all the way but was beaten by the margin of a point after touchdown.

Michigan, hitherto undefeated, was no match at all for Pitt's Panthers who rolled up a 26-0 count. Mississippi, which had scored a sensational victory over Louisiana State several weeks ago, itself fell victim to a late rally by Vanderbilt, 13-7.

Oregon's hard-hit array was soundly beaten by Stanford's hitherto disappointing Indians, 27-16.

The eastern program produced several other major developments as Purdue rallied to tie Fordham, 6-6; Army three times came from behind to trip Harvard, 20-17; and Michigan State ran up a 26-0 count on West Virginia.

Texas Christian gave new evidence of tremendous power in rolling over Texas A. and M., 34-6, a week after the Aggies had held Santa Clara to a 7-0 score. Arkansas pushed hapless Texas around, 42-6, as Baylor planned a 13-0 defeat on non-southwest conference territory.

Notre Dame spilled Illinois but Ohio State and Northwestern, on the one hand, and Indiana and Nebraska on the other, played to scoreless draws. Iowa defeated Chicago, 27-14.

Oklahoma began its Big Six drive by toppling Kansas, 19-0 as Iowa State, recent conqueror of Nebraska, outpointed Missouri, 16-13.

Tennessee's notable triumph over Alabama dominated the southern picture where Tulane handed Heli, its third straight beating, 26-17; Duke nipped Georgia Tech, 6-0, and Washington and Lee surprised with an 8-0 verdict over Kentucky.

The clay rocky mountain "Big Seven" whirl got itself into real trouble as Utah State bowed to Denver, 7-0, and Brigham Young was tied by Utah, 7-7. George Washington's Colonials, trimmed Colorado, 13-0.

## WILLAMETTE WINS IN SOUTH, 6 TO 3

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Willamette university's Beavers came from behind with a fourth quarter touchdown today to defeat the Santa Barbara State Gauchos, 6 to 3.

Battling through a scoreless first half, Santa Barbara scored first in the third period when fullback Merlo and halfback McArthur ran the ball from their own 45 to the Willamette 9. Stopped cold (for three downs), Merlo dropped back to the 15 and placed a field goal.

Midway in the fourth Miller, a sub back, slashed off right tackle and dashed 34 yards to the Gaucho 5-yard line. Three line backs gained nothing, but on the last try Drury blasted his right guard for the winning touchdown.

The Gauchoes began passing, and aided by a penalty imposed on the Beavers for slugging, reached the Willamette 33; but Weakley intercepted a Gaucho pass to end the threat.

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Machine-like in its precision, a blocking, socking unit that drove relentlessly forward, University of California's 1938 contribution to the football world steam-rolled over the University of California at Los Angeles here today by a 20 to 7 score.

After a scoreless first quarter the "feeling out" period for the two academic brothers of the state, the Bears powerful attack began clicking in stirring fashion.

Two ground gaining drives, that saw the UCLA defense shattered and scattered over the field, found the Bears banging at the touchdown door.

Only one pass was tried—and completed—in the initial touchdown march. It ended with left half back Vic Bottari, individual ball carrying star of the game, rambling around the opposition's tight end for a yard and the score. He put the finishing touch on the 36 yard advance by dropping the extra point.

The Bears went in for the half time rest leading 13 to nothing and with all the statistics in their favor. In first downs they had eight to one and in yards from scrimmage, 149 to 38.

The third period was scoreless, with UCLA providing the attacking thrills in a 57 yard change which went from their own 19 to California's 24, before a setback which lost the ball in downs on the latter's 46. Ken Washington, Bruins left halfback, opened the drive with a 33 yard run, longest of the day.

As the third period neared a close, California took the ball on a pass interception on the Bruins' 47. From there, with a teamwork of substitutes in the lineup, it smashed to its third touchdown.

With second and third string reserves still in the California lineup, the Bruins pushed over their lone touchdown near the close of the game.

A crowd of 2000 saw the game, largest in several years.

Klamath Falls and Medford clash here next Friday night in a battle expected to decide the conference title.

EUREKA, Calif., Oct. 15.—(AP)—A two-touchdown comeback gave Eureka a 14-6 victory Friday night over a stubborn Medford high school team in an inter-sectional game watched by 1600 fans.

The visitors took an early lead midway through the first period when they climaxed a 48-yard drive by an 18-yard pass, Bowman to Caples, the receiver falling across the goal line. Gillespie's drop kick was low.

Eureka, driving deep into enemy territory from its own 28, principally on a 60-yard return of a kickoff by Angler, scored at the start of the second quarter, Prentice going over from the five-yard line and Carrano kicked the point.

Medford held the Eureka club on even terms until the fourth period, when the defenders broke away again and scored. Medford made five first downs to Eureka's eight and gained 103 yards by rushing to 175 for Eureka. Medford completed three of 11 passes for 38 yards.

Coach Bill Bowerman, returning to Medford yesterday afternoon with his team, stated that the battle was "the most vicious high school game I have ever seen."

All Tiger players were bruised and battered and Franklin Jones, 185-pound left guard, suffered a concussion which forced him to spend Friday night in the Eureka hospital. Jones sustained the injury in the second quarter, after savagely tackling a Eureka ball carrier. During the half-time intermission he was injured by his head, and Coach Bowerman had him taken to the hospital. The injury was not serious, but it will put Jones out of action for at least one week, the mentor said.

Also injured was Al Barrow, big left tackle, who hurt his knee and elbow and will probably be out of the Klamath Falls game here next Friday night, and Bill Caples, right halfback, who got his bad leg bumped again. He will play against Klamath Falls, however, Coach Bowerman stated.

## UNBEATEN IDAHO COME FROM REAR TO ROUT GONZAGA

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 15.—(AP)—University of Idaho's unbeaten Vandals came from behind to slap down the Gonzaga university Bulldogs 26 to 12 today in a game which saw all scoring completed in a wild first half. First period score was: Gonzaga 12, Idaho 6.

A crowd of 8,500 sat in a drizzling rain to see the underdog Gonzagans fight every inch of the way and keep the Idaho first string on the field almost every minute.

Sparkling runs marked the scoring in the first half, topped by a 101-yard kickoff return in the first quarter by Jim McGuire, Gonzaga fullback, and a 63-yard punt return by Harold Rolse, Idaho left half, in the second period.

Idaho scored in the first eight minutes after Rolse had gained an advantage with a 88-yard boot in a punt exchange.

On the following kickoff, McGuire took the ball a yard behind his own goal and went the length of the field without being touched.

Two minutes later, Canadeo passed 20 yards to Ray Hare, halfback, who went 20 more to the Idaho four. Canadeo went over.

Opening the second quarter, Idaho recovered a Gonzaga fumble on the Gonzaga 40 and drove to a touchdown.

Gonzaga received and punted after failing to gain. Rolse took it on his own 37 and scored standing up, going 63 yards.

Just before the half ended, Lyle Smith, Idaho substitute center, intercepted a Gonzaga forward pass in midfield and went to the Gonzaga 11. Rolse went around end to score on the next play. His kick was wide.

## LEGAL TANGLE IN ACCIDENT ACTION

PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The \$25,000 suit Virginia Degroote filed against Mary and Charles Welch of Roseburg, presented something of a problem today in federal court.

The attorney said, therefore, that he doubted whether the law could take a hand and award damages to either party.

There the case remained awaiting further developments.
