Five Great Concert Attractions to Be Presented in Eugene

EUGENE, Oct. 15.—(Special)—Five of the greatest concert attractions in the world will be presented by the associated students of the University of Oregon during the coming school year.

Fritz Kreisler, world-famed violinist, is the first artist scheduled for the McArthur court series. He will be followed by Serge Jaroff and the Don Cosack chorus, Trudi Schoop, Paamore and Terrace, and Igor Gorin.

Season tickets for the series are now on sale. Out-of-town enthusiasts may purchase tickets by writing to the University ticket office at McArthur court.

Connoisseurs of music have lauded the 1938-39 concert program, under sponsorship of the associated students, as one of the greatest ever planned at the University of Oregon.

Kreisler, known internationally as the master of the violin, will play here the night of November 7. This will be his first appearance in Eugene and perhaps the only opportunity for southern Oregon persons to see and hear him.

Serge Jaroff and the Don Cosack chorus, who made a tremendous hit with a vast audience here two years ago, will appear again at McArthur court November 16. The 36 "singing horsemen of the steppes" are unique in the world of songs.

Paamore and Terrace, American-born and American-trained duopianists, will play here January 19. Trudi Schoop and her comic ballet, billed as something entirely different in the concert world, are scheduled for March 2.

Igor Gorin, a 29-year-old tenor who has been acclaimed the new idol of the world's concert audiences, will sing here March 26.

Madame Perkins Has Suggestion
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 15.—(AP) Secretary of Labor Perkins proposed today creation of a 13-member commission to mediate the dispute between the C. I. O. and the A. F. of L. She suggested that each organization choose five of its "trusted and experienced representatives" who in turn would select three disinterested persons. The representatives of the labor groups, she said, should have authority to bind their organizations to adhere to any agreement the commission reached.

Northwest Grain Market Stronger
PORTLAND, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Support by Williamette valley buyers seeking feed and some buying by turkey growers continued to bolster northwest grain markets in the past week, the United States department of agriculture said today.
Barley was fully steady. Growers did not press sales, receipts here totaling only 10 carlots. Oats, likewise, were steady with receipts reaching 17 carlots, while corn showed some fluctuation although demand was steady and receipts totaled 23 carlots.
