- By Mrs. Alexander George Supper Serving Four Creamed Salmon and Peas Noodle Ring Stuffed Celery Biscuits Pineapple Conserve Sliced Bananas and Cream Old-Fashioned Rich Sugar Cookies Tea or Coffee Creamed Salmon and Peas 3 tablespoons flour 4 tablespoons butter 2 cups milk 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon white pepper 2-3 cup salmon 2-3 cup cooked peas 1 tablespoon minced pimientos 1 teaspoon minced parsley Melt butter. Add flour and, when mixed, add milk. Cook until a creamy sauce forms, stirring constantly. Add rest of ingredients and cook until "steaming." Serve in noodle ring.

- 1 1/2 cups broken noodles 4 cups boiling water 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 eggs beaten 2-3 cup milk 1/4 teaspoon celery salt 1/4 teaspoon paprika 2 tablespoons butter, melted. Add noodles to water, salt. Boil quickly for ten minutes. Drain and rinse in cold water to remove any "stickiness." Add rest of ingredients and pour into a buttered ring mold. Bake in a pan of hot water for 35 minutes in a moderately slow oven. Unmold carefully. Fill and surround with salmon mixture. Old-Fashioned Rich Sugar Cookies 1 cup butter 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar 3 eggs beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon almond extract 1/4 teaspoon salt 3 1/2 cups flour 1 teaspoon baking powder Nut meats Cream butter and sugar until soft. Add eggs, extract and salt. Beat for two minutes. Add flour and baking powder. Mix just enough to hold the ingredients together. Take up small bits of dough and roll in the hands into one-half inch balls. Flatten on greased baking sheet and press nuts into tops. Bake for eight minutes in a moderate oven.
