NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(UP)—A substance common to whole wheat bread, oatmeal, cornmeal and similar cereals is the direct cause of dental decay and other "so-called diseases of civilization," the pathodontic section of the first district dental society of the state of New York was told last night.

Dr. P. H. Belding, dentist, reported on 12 years of research conducted by his brother, Lieut. L. J. Belding of the U. S. navy, who is a physician, which led to the conclusion that "diet of civilization is directly related to dental caries (decay)."
