County Budget Board Will Meet Thursday

Next session of the county budget committee, A. C. Hubbard, chairman, will be held Thursday, October 27, when final consideration of the amounts in the budget will be started. By that time the county clerk's office will have a recapitulation of figures ready.

County Judge Day said today the budget for county departments would be about the same as last year, but with reductions wherever possible.

Tuesday the budget committee listened to arguments advanced by Jackson county farmers favoring retention of government hunters, for control of predatory animals. Previously a delegation had requested return of the bounty system on the grounds it would provide needed finances for rural residents.

MAIL BAG RIFLED BY NAZI AGENTS, EX-SPY REVEALS

(Continued from Page One) Rumrich was indicted with the other defendants and thirteen others, but pleaded guilty at the start of the trial. This was his third day on the stand.

The stolid ex-dishwasher, who became a \$40 a week "mail order" spy, chewed gum as he told of a night when Karl Schlueter, an alleged messenger from the spy ring, came to his home in the Bronx with Fraulien Hofmann.

Schlueter asked him what he knew of the aircraft carriers Enterprise and Yorktown.

"He said the German navy was now going to build some aircraft carriers and that it would be very useful for his superiors to obtain plans of these carriers' construction," Rumrich testified.

"He suggested I write to Hamburg and suggest I be furnished with some stationery that would show it was official White House stationery."

"He said something about forwarding a letter to the construction chief of the United States navy department, the letter bearing the forged signature of the president of the United States. But he did not elaborate on this plan."

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WORK PROGRESSING ON RIVER FLOW STATION

APPLAGATE, Oct. 19.—(Sp.)—Work was progressing today on the stream flow measuring station being constructed by the U. S. geological survey on the Applagate river below Squaw creek.

Purpose of the station, which will require another week or 10 days to complete, is to procure information on the water supply in connection with a possible storage reservoir for the control and use of the river. The general investigation is being made under direction of army engineers.

Five men of the Applagate OCC camp are assisting in constructing the measuring station. Foreman in charge is Earl Hansen for the geological survey.
