

DIRECTOR DEFINES EXEMPTED CLASS IN NEW WAGE LAW

Revision Requests Will Be Given Hearing Is Word—Law Effective Monday Governs Eleven Million

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Director P. Andrews, wage-hour administrator, issued today definitions

of professionals, executives, outside salesmen and persons engaged in a retail occupation who will be exempt from the fair labor standards act which becomes effective Monday.

At the same time, he announced a person could apply for a revision of the definitions and possibly would be granted a hearing.

"If the administrator believes reasonable cause for amendments of the regulations is set forth," Andrews said, "he will either schedule a hearing with due notice to the interested parties, or will make other provision for affording them an opportunity to present their views."

Effective Monday

"In determining such future regulations, separate treatment for different industries and for different classes of employees may be given consideration."

Andrews issued no interpretation

on how the definitions would be applied to specific industries. His advice is that all of whom will be exempt from the fair labor standards act which becomes effective Monday.

Employers have four days in which to complete preparations for complying with the law.

The statutes, laying down basic work standards for 11,000,000 wage-earners in interstate commerce, become effective at 12:01 a. m. next Monday.

Before that time thousands of small employers must decide if they have not already done so, whether they come under the law. Others must draw distinctions between their workers who are subject to the act and those who are exempt, such as apprentices and professional men.

Andrew's immediate task was to issue a series of regulations clarifying

controversial clauses in the law, defining exemptions and instructing employers on the records they must keep to show proper compliance.

Many Puzzled

At the same time he said his aides sought to reply as rapidly as possible to hundreds of inquiries from business firms puzzled over the question of compliance.

Uncertainty has arisen chiefly among firms which produce goods for both interstate and intra-state commerce. Purely intrastate businesses are exempt.

Andrews said it was impossible to lay down a general rule for the guidance of these "borderline" employers and each case must be determined on its merits. He suggested, however, any employer who was in doubt should consult.

The final decision rests with the employer, since Andrews' opinions

MUNITION ORDERS HINT SPEEDING UP IN U. S. REARMING

Over Nineteen Millions Expended in Six Weeks—Forces Doubled at Some Manufacturing Arsenal

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(AP)—War department orders for munitions totaling \$19,187,000 in six weeks pro-

vided a hint today the army is speeding up rearmament in anticipation of President Roosevelt's new defense proposals.

Contractors have worked day and night to close contracts with manufacturers without delay.

Orders at some manufacturing arsenals have been doubled, but the far greater facilities of private industry must make the bulk of any further munitions which congress may authorize at the president's request.

\$9,000,000 announced.

The latest orders, announced yesterday, totaled more than \$9,000,000. They accounted for the bulk of nearly \$61,000,000 which congress voted this year for anti-aircraft guns, tanks, powder and bombs.

The largest was a \$2,317,291 order for smokeless powder to E. I. DuPont de Nemours & company, Wil-

mington, Del. Shooting machine guns costing \$2,038,600 were ordered from Colt's Patent Firearms Manufacturing company, Hartford, Conn.

Earlier contracts were for searchlights, direction finders and other apparatus connected with 240-inch three-inch anti-aircraft guns already being made in government arsenals.

The munitions contracts, the recent "industrial" orders to familiarize manufacturers with production of intricate arms, an administration move to strengthen the power network around 16 big industrial centers, and Mr. Roosevelt's disclosure of mass production of airplanes may be considered—all fit into detailed war department plans to mobilize industry in an emergency.


