

# FRENCH STUDYING TROOP MOVEMENT IN LARGE PLANES

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PARIS—(UP)—French aviation experts are studying plans for using the new series of giant seaplanes of the Lieutenant Paris type, of which France will soon have five, as troop transports across the Mediterranean.

It is estimated that each of the planes could carry 150 men in addition to the crew. In event of naval warfare in the Mediterranean, which would make troop transport by sea unsafe, these planes could make regular night flights and bring across 750 men nightly.

Besides the Lieutenant Paris, which now is making a series of experimental flights over the North Atlantic southern route, via the Azores and Bermuda to New York, the French already have two planes of the same type. They belong to the navy auxiliary air force.

A fourth Laticese plane of the same type is nearing completion at Biscarosse near Bordeaux, and a fifth is under construction for Air France, commercial air transport line.

Experts figure that 150 men could easily be carried. They would make a total weight, with equipment, of about 15 tons. The Lieutenant Paris weighs 18½ tons empty and 37 tons normally with a full load, although one of its recent Atlantic flights the ship took off easily carrying 41 tons. The weight of the men would leave the plane well under capacity and still allow room for enough gasoline for a flight across the Mediterranean.

Only slight alterations to the internal design of the ships would be needed to carry 150 soldiers. They have two decks, and 112 could easily be carried comfortably on the lower deck and 38 on the upper deck in addition to the crew.

Their equipment would be included in the total weight and there would be room for it either in the same compartments as the men or in fore and aft chambers.

4. Here's How—Add to creamed butter ¼ as much of chopped green olives. After spreading Snow Flake crackers, top with a rolled anchovy fillet.
