

SONS WILL STAGE ALCOTT PLAY FOR TEACHERS REUNION

"Little Women" To Be Given October 27, 28, 29 As Highlight Of Educational Conference, Homecoming

ASHLAND, Oct. 22.—(Sp.)—When 1500 teachers from Klamath, Lake, Curry, Josephine, Douglas and Jackson counties gather here Thursday, Friday and Saturday, October 27, 28 and 29, for the fourth annual educational conference at Southern Oregon Normal school, one of the high-lighted attractions will be the presentation of the old favorite Louisa M. Alcott play, "Little Women."

Scheduled for production in the SONS auditorium on the opening night of the meet, the play is under direction of Angus L. Bowmer, Normal school dramatic instructor and director of the now-famous Oregon Shakespearean Festival.

Costumes of the 1850 period have been made by the play production classes under the expert eye of Lois Bowmer, wife of the director, and sets also were designed and constructed by the class.

In undertaking "Little Women" the SONS players are making special concession to the value presented in training for hundreds of dramatic instructors among the teachers who will attend from the various counties. This play has been selected as one, with its human characteristics, and very human characteristics, which may be presented by any student body in southern Oregon.

All talented, some experienced in stage work, the cast of "Little Women" is picked at random from the SONS student body.

William Westfall, in the part of "John Brooks" is an Ashland boy who for two years has worked under Bowmer and was a dramatic fan in high school.

John Barker, another Ashland boy, has about the same experience and will be cast as "Professor Bhaer."

As "Meg" will be Louise DuBois, a second-year student from Medford, Wis., who has worked in many Shakespearean productions.

Janet Young, Ashland girl, has the lead as "Jo" and is active in her first year as a SONS student.

From Cottage Grove comes Dorothy Siemann, a first-year student, who takes the part of "Amy."

Another first-year student, Jeanette Fields, Medford, plays "Marmee."

Lois Firestone, the "Beth" of the play, hails from Talent and is active in musical circles of the Normal where she plays first violin in the school orchestra.
