GIRL BEATEN TO DEATH BY FANATIC COUPLE, IS PROSECUTOR'S CHARGE

ROUGHTON, Mich., Oct. 24—(P)—Pros. Frank C. Condon said today Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Pritchette, whom he described as religious fanatics, confessed they killed their 19-year-old maid, Marian Doyle, with a flat iron and poker at their Dollar Bay home because they believed she was "possessed of a devil."

Condon obtained a warrant charging both with first degree murder and said they would be arraigned probably tomorrow, before Justice John McCarty.

The prosecutor said Pritchette admitted he beat the girl with a flat iron and choked her, then held her while Mrs. Pritchette beat her with a poker.

The Pritchettes are 35 years old. The girl was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Doyle of Hancock, Mich.

The slaying was discovered after the Pritchettes went to a Calumet, Mich., priest and informed him they exerted a mysterious "power" over a victim at their home. The priest notified Sheriff John G. Salmi of Roughton and he went to the Dollar Bay home, found the young woman dead and arrested the Pritchettes.

Miss Doyle's head was crushed and her neck broken.

EXPLOSIONS LEVEL BIG POWDER PLANT

COLUMBUS, Kans., Oct. 24—(AP)—The Hercules Powder company plant at Turck, north of here, virtually was wiped out this afternoon in a series of explosions that leveled nine of the buildings there.

All employees escaped uninjured. The fire started from a prairie fire raging out of control. Highways were blocked for miles around the plant.

The main mill was first to go, with eight other buildings following in almost regular salute order.

The explosions were felt for more than half a mile and dense clouds of smoke and flame shot hundreds of feet into the air.

None of the big magazines had exploded although the fire was within 200 yards of the largest.

Martin Will Meet Visiting Senator

SALEM, Oct. 24—(AP)—Governor Charles H. Martin will meet U. S. Sen. Edward B. Burke (D., Neb.) at the Multnomah hotel in Portland tomorrow morning, the governor said today.

"We served in the federal house of representatives together, and he is a very dear friend of mine," the governor said.

The governor was congressman from the third district (Multnomah county) from 1930 to 1934, when he became governor.

Last Marion G. A. R. Answers Final Call

WOODBURN, Ore., Oct. 24—(AP)—Funeral services will be held here Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Ethan H. Cowles, 65, last surviving member of the G. A. R. in Marion county.

Mr. Cowles was a native of Massachusetts. As a member of the 31st Massachusetts volunteers he served four years in the Civil war under General Butler in the department of the Gulf. After the war he went to Montana where he helped organize and became the first president of the Montana Cattlemen's association.
