AMERICAN PASSPORTS EASY TO OBTAIN FOR NAZI SPIES IS CLAIM

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(AP)—In spite of the uproar over the Robinson-Ruben passport affair, Guenther Gustav Rummich, German secret agent, was confident he could procure passport blanks for Nazi spies, he testified today in federal court. Rummich made the statement under cross-examination by Benjamin Mathews, counsel for Erich Glaser, one of the three defendants on trial before Judge John C. Knox and a jury on espionage charges. An attempt last February to get the passport blanks by telephoning the state department office here, requesting they be sent to a hotel, led to Rummich's arrest and the seizure later of Glaser, Johanna Hoffmann and Otto Hermann Voss, co-defendants in the trial. The Robinson-Ruben passport matter involved two Americans, traveling in Russia on passports containing false information.

FOES OF AGE PENSION BEATEN IN COLORADO; DAMAGE SOUND TRUCK

PUEBLO, Colo., Oct. 25.—(AP)—Two operators of a sound truck used by an organization seeking to return Colorado's 845 old age pension law, most liberal of any such statute in the nation, were beaten today on a downtown Pueblo corner and the truck was damaged. William Fitzgerald and Vernon Tucker, operators of the truck, were quoted by Police Chief J. Arthur Grady as saying a dozen men, who appeared to be old age pensioners, set upon them when they stopped the vehicle. The two men are employed by the Federation For Workable Old Age Pensions, an organization seeking to return control of pensions to the state legislature. The sound truck, used by the federation to broadcast speeches at street corners prior to a vote on the issue at the November election, once before was the object of an attack. Rotten eggs were hurled at it at Craig, Colo.
