

Junior High Squad Tangles With Grants Pass Frosh Here Tonight

HARRINGTON BOYS HAVE CHANCE TO CINCH GRID TITLE

Game Will Be Last On Home Turf for Locals — Season's Record Shows 3 Victories in 4 Starts

Medford junior high school's fine football machine—one of the best in several years—plays its last home game of the season tonight at the high school stadium, clashing with the strong Grants Pass freshman team in a game which may clinch the Southern Oregon junior high championship for Coach George Harrington's club. The opening kickoff is at 8 o'clock.

Victors in three out of four tilts so far this campaign, the local juniors will become unduped titleholders by beating the junior Cate-men. Medford has already walloped 2-land, 12-0; Central Point high, 12-0; and Grants Pass last week, 6-0. As Grants Pass and Ashland battled to a scoreless deadlock, a Medford win this evening will rivet the pennant to the local mascot.

Jacksonville high handed the Medford juniors their only setback of the year, by a 6 to 0 count.

Coach Harrington has been drilling his charges on timing of offensive plays, general defensive maneuvers, and downfield blocking the past week, and announces that they are all in good shape for the encounter.

Starting lineup will consist of Mitchell, center; Glenn and Higgins, guards; Morgan and Baglin, tackles; Wall and Leonard, ends; Stead, quarter; Weber and Wray, halfbacks, and Hopkins, full. Wincey, Ock of Phoenix will referee; Bernie Hughes of Medford will umpire and Bob Woods of Jacksonville will act as head-linesman.

A large crowd is expected to turn out for the last look at the juniors in action in Medford. Remaining games, with Central Point high and Ashland junior high, will be played on the road.

LOCAL MEN GET FOUR BIG BUCKS

A party of five hunters returned to Medford from eastern Oregon last night with four big bucks to show for their three days of hunting.

In the party were V. C. Bishop of 116 Mistletoe street, his sons, Bob and Bill, his father, J. L. Bishop and Charles Watson. V. C. Bishop is a rancher at Table Rock. The men have hunted together for years.

The hunting was done in Barnes valley about 30 miles south of Bly. Three of the four mule deer were bagged on Monday, day before the close of the Oregon deer hunting season. The other was shot Sunday afternoon.

Three of the bucks were four-pointers, one a three-pointer. The largest dressed at 200 pounds. The others averaged around 150 pounds.

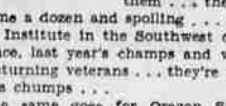
"It was the best hunting trip we've had in years although the deer were not at all plentiful and were really hard to get," V. C. Bishop said.

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Americans Heavy Winners In Hospital Sweepstakes

CUMBERLAND, B. C., Oct. 26.—(CP)—Mrs. Ronald Sutton of Cumberland was a little more than \$80,000 richer today, but she sold a half interest in her Irish hospital sweepstakes ticket Monday and missed a chance to win \$150,000 when Contrevent won the Cesarewitch at Newmarket, England.

Mrs. Sutton's husband—a coal miner who works part-time in a Vancouver Island mine near here—said she sold the half to an English syndicate which operates from New York. He said she received \$5358 for the share, making her winnings from her ticket \$50,358.

Mrs. Sutton herself was too excited to say anything about selling half her ticket when she was awakened by a telephone call this morning to hear the news Contrevent had won. She gasped a delighted "Oh, my goodness," as she heard the news.

Uncle Sam Too!

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Treasury experts estimated today they would collect about \$935,000 in income taxes on the \$1,775,000 of major prizes won by Americans on the Cesarewitch sweepstakes race.

The exact amount of the taxes will depend on other income of the prize winners, but assuming all the prize money is taxable at minimum rates, the treasury bill is as follows:

\$85,000 from each of the seven who won \$150,000 each on the first place Contrevent.
\$20,120 from each of the seven who won \$75,000 each on the second place Dubonnet.
\$9,700 from each of the four who won \$50,000 apiece on the third place Fet.
