

### COAST'S FARMERS AWARE OF DANGER IN LABOR RACKETS

#### Threat to Livelihood Seen in Dictatorial Demands of Union Overlords—Unable Handle Own Produce

Farmers up and down the Pacific coast are alert to the menace that threatens their livelihood in the form of the dictatorial demands of the overlords of union labor in connection with the marketing of farm products.

In certain districts, notably Seattle and central and northern California, the bosses of unionism have been able to impose their demands to such an extent that farm products are exclusively handled by union members. In Seattle all milk delivered from the surrounding area arrived by union trucks. Farmers are prohibited by the unions, as there is no city, county or state law to this effect, from trucking their own milk. In San Francisco all farm produce, unless it is trucked by the farmer-producer, or his son, is classified as "hot" and will not be handled by the city warehousemen. When farmers do their own trucking they are prevented by the unions from unloading produce, this work being done by union members at eight dollars a day, or a dollar an hour.

**Californians Oppose**

In Southern California the farmers have vigorously opposed such demands and so far have been successful in preventing interference with trucking by themselves or their regular employees.

Speaking in behalf of the preservation of the constitutional right of the farmer, H. L. Shoemaker, president of the Associated Farmers of Oregon, said:

"Our association has sponsored initiative measure 816 X which is to come before the voters of Oregon in the November elections because we feel that such a measure, by regulating picketing and boycotting by labor unions and associations, will serve to destroy the power of the labor racketeer and his policies of violence and intimidation when furthering his illegal demands.

"This bill does not effect the present legal status of organized labor, but is aimed at eliminating the many evil practices of the gangster leaders and their henchmen, who seek to control the commerce and industry of Oregon.

"Measure 816 X deserves the support of every farmer in Oregon who looks forward to peaceful and prosperous years of true American industry."

### SOVIET DECORATES MILITARY HEROES

MOSCOW, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Pravda and Izvestia, organs of the communist party and the government, today

printed a long list of soviet fighters decorated last July and August.

Marshal Vasily K. Blucher, commander-in-chief of the red army in the east, was not mentioned, increasing mystification in foreign circles as to his whereabouts.

Three other officers, however—Corps Commander Grigori Steyn, chief of the first Primorsk army, Division Commander Feodor Simenovsky and Brigade Commander Pavel

Rybagoff—were decorated with the Order of the Red Banner "for successful management of military operations at Lake Chanchi"—the Changkufeng area.
