

Medford Juniors Take Championship With 25-6 Win Over G. Pass

HARRINGTON LADS SCORE FREELY IN LAST HALF RALLY

Long Runs Bring Trio of Touchdowns — Hopkins Scores 4th With 2-Yard Smash As Curtain Falls

Outplayed and held to a 6 to 6 standoff in the first half, Medford junior high's football team exploded a three-touchdown barrage in the last two quarters to wallop the Grants Pass freshmen, 25 to 6, last night at the stadium. The victory gave Coach George Harrington's team the southern Oregon junior high school championship.

Three of Medford's four touchdowns were scored on long and thrilling broken-field runs, two of them by Cato Wray, left halfback, and one by Bob Stead, fullback, Curt Hopkins, right half, tallied the final six-point with a two-yard smash over right guard just before the game ended.

G. Pass Scores First
Grants Pass scored first in the initial period, Clayton going over from the one-yard line after a forward pass gained 18 yards. The baby Cawmen recovered a Medford fumble on the 35-yard line and wasted no time in getting their score. A line plunge failed to add the extra point. The local juniors deadlocked the count before the first quarter was ended by sending Wray through a hole at left tackle. With great downfield blocking, Wray cut back and raced 54 yards to the goal line. Curt Hopkins attempted dropkick for the extra point was wide, and that's the way the first half ended—6 to 6. The half-time gun halted Grants Pass on the Medford one-yard stripe.

CANZONERI WINS NOD OVER COWBOY SCOTT IN COMEBACK OPENER

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Oct. 27.—(UP)—Tony Canzoneri, former world featherweight, lightweight and junior welterweight boxing champion, scored the first victory of his comeback last night at Braddock arena where 2,000 fans saw him whip Howard (Cowboy) Scott of Washington, D. C., in the main eight rounder.

Referee Whitey Healy's decision in favor of Canzoneri was greeted with mixed boos and cheers. The United Press score sheet gave Canzoneri the fourth, fifth sixth and seventh rounds; Scott the second and third; the first and last rounds were even. Canzoneri weighed 140, his opponent, 138. After the fight Canzoneri said: "I'm beginning to feel good in the ring again. I need seven or eight tuneups to improve my speed and timing of punches and get into proper shape. I'm satisfied with my showing considering the long layoff."

TROUT PLANTED IN NEARBY DISTRICTS

During the past season 456,200 fingerling trout were planted in the streams and lakes of the Butte Falls, Union Creek and Lake O' Woods districts of the Rogue River national forest, reports by forest rangers today showed.

The restocking was a cooperative project between the U. S. forest service and the fish hatcheries at Butte Falls and Klamath. In the lakes and streams of the Lake O' Woods district, 217,000 silver-side, rainbow and eastern brook trout were planted. In the Rogue river and its tributaries in the Union Creek districts, 200,000 rainbow trout were stocked. In the lakes and streams of the Butte Falls district, 41,200 rainbow trout were planted.

Verbiok and Childers Definitely Out of Lineup — Thurman Doubtful — Let-Down Worries Bowerman

With Coaches Bill Bowerman, Russ Acheson and Ed Kirtley, and student managers Dick Finch, Bob Bromley and Jimmy Balze, Medford high's football squad will leave early tomorrow morning in private automobiles for Bend, where tomorrow night the Tigers face the Lava Bears under the lights.

The Black Tornado will move against the powerful Bend eleven minus the services of three regulars. Bob Verbiok, left end, is definitely on the sidelines with a sprained knee; Johnny Childers has been nursing a bad cold all week and won't start the game at a guard post, and Louis Thurman, big soph fullback, is a doubtful participant because of an injured back resulting from a game at Klamath Falls.

Letdown Worries
Because of the sharp letdown of the Tigers following their savage 6 to 0 victory over Klamath Falls Friday night, Bowerman is viewing the Bend game with something approaching alarm. The team has taken things easy this week, giving their bruised and battered bodies a rest, and all players realize the Lava Bear encounter will be one of their toughest. Last year, the Tigers fell by a score of 32 to 7.

Beate, to date, has lost only one

game, a 12 to 6 verdict to The Dalles. The Lava Bears have beaten their Aluma, 13 to 6; Redmond, 7 to 0; Hill Military, 24 to 0; Oregon City, 20 to 0 and Albany, 20 to 7. Quarterly scores will be received by the Mail Tribune tomorrow night, and the office will be open for those desiring to know how the Tornado is making out.

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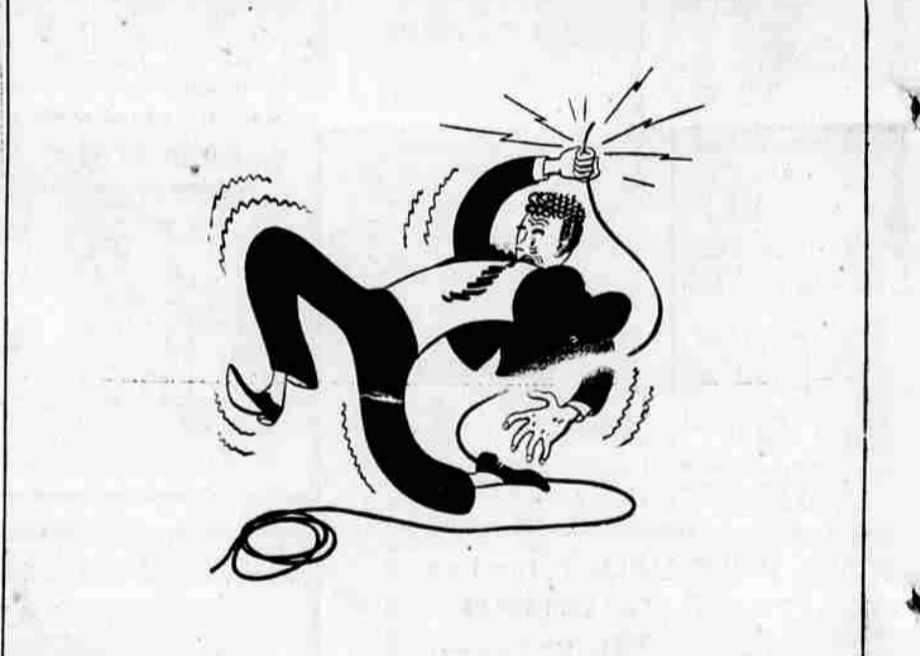
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
